Following recent discussions the following notes are submitted for consideration:

It ia agreed that in a satiofactory method of taking un the Land from the Benabans on a communal basis could be cram up and agreed with them it would overcome many dixituolties and it is conslcored that the B. Fo. could with advantage pay up to 210,000 acicitional to make such a scheme posable.

Under the present method of taking up phosphate land each individual block has to be located and then surveyed. The area $i s$ computed iron the closure and the aided total area of the blocks has to agree $\begin{aligned} & \text { th } \\ & \text { tine total area acquired this necessitates }\end{aligned}$ extensive accurate survey wow on say 1.400 blocks in the two areas to be dealt with. Additional staff as outlined in my notes dated 13th way 1947 would be require ai to get this work completed in reasonable time.

The land already acquired in the central and 150 Acre areas would represent an equitable bails for what can be expected fin the nev areas to be taken over.

As the land has been acquired in two defined areas of 291 and 380 acres at varying price I consider any command scheme should apply separately so each of the areas sa it would be contusing to the Dainabens to try and consolidate the areas at this stare.

If this is acred, it is considered essential that, the Banabans point out their blocks to confirm the holdings in each section. The main comers of each block would bs approximately located by congas to alloy of it being roughly plotted on a plan zr record purposes.

CHRISTMAS ISLAND

A copy of your letter has been sent forward to the Australian and New Zealand Commissioners today. I expect that Mr Ward will approach the British Govemment regarding the acquisition of Christmas Island soon after he returns from Geneva.

## 2.

## LIMIT P OR NAURU \& OCSAN ISLAND OUTPUT

You will have noticed a reference to this made in the memorandum which I prepared for Mr. Ward regarding Christmas Island. I have drafted a letter of official advice to Canberra and Wellington in accordance with Minute 485. This will be submitted to Mr. Webster when he is in Melbourne next week, and I will let you know in due course whether it is forwarded by him to Canberra and by Sir Albert Ellis to Wellington.

## 3.

## LAND TERMS

I agree that the Colonial office should be informed regarding the terms agreed for the acquisition of land at Nauru and Ocean Island. With my letter No. 279 you received a copy of a letter dated Jud June from sir Albert kalis to Mr. Shanahen regarding ocean Island land. This, except for the penultimate paragraph, is in identical terms with the advice to Canberra, end I suggest that you might use the same form. If you prefer the terms of your draft, I suggest the following alterations:

Line 4. "Rosicient Commissioner" instead of "Chief sands

Line 7. "sale of land at ocean instead of "sale of Ocean Island"
omit last paragraph.


I have the honour to forvard a cony of the final "Statement of the Intentions of the Government" regarding the future of the Banaban community on Rabi Island, as agreed to between the Banaban representatives on the one hand and tiose of the Fiji and Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony adminjstrations on the other at a series of meetings held at Rabi from the 8 th to the IIth Kay, 1947.
2. Mr. Macconald, Assistant Colonial Secretary, Fiji, representing that Government and myself, representing the administration of the Gilbert and Milice Islands Colony, arrived at habi on the evening of the 7th hay and left at apnoximately mianight on the 13th. Six days in all were therefore spent on. the island: of these the 8 th to the loth were occupied in dis.cussions with the Banaban community, part of the loth and all the llth in balloting on whether they wished to remain un Rabi or return to Ocean Islana anã the final two days in further conierences with the Banabans in explanation of the consequences of their final decision and in discussions with Major F.G. L. Holland, O.B.E., G.ii., the Administrative Officen on Rabi Island (now to be known as the Banaban Adeiser) on Banaban accounts and other allied matters.
3. The "Statement of Intentions" is based on the draft "nemorandum of Agreement" prepared by me at Tarawa in accoruance with the instructions contajined in the correspondence ending with the High Commissinner's telegram No. 171 of the 5th liarch. Tris draft, which incorporated the various recormendations set out in ny memoranaum of the 2nd September, 1946, on "The Future of the Banaban Population", was discussed by irr. Dacdonald with the Attomey-General and various changes incorporated in conformity with his auvice. The Attorney-General, furthermore, doubted whether the document would, in any case, have any legal validity and felt that it would be best cast in the form of a statement of proposed Government policy vis-a-vis the Banabans, assuming that they elected to make Radi their future homeland.
4. I had anticipated, when draftinc my main memorandum referred to above, that any proposals made to the Banabans along tre lines there advocated woula meet with a favourabie response; and the event did not disappoint iiy hopes. It is true that nostalcia for their old homeland vas eviaent on all sides, and particularly anong the older Banabans, operatinc as a goweriul drae away from the consideration of Rabi as a future home. Indeed, so potent was the very understandable call of their arestral home that several leaders of the commuity were deaf to all argument oased on more material consicierations, and I feared more than once that their persuasive appeals micht carry the rest with them on a wave of idealistic sentimentality. The superior acivantages oi remaining on Rabi under the terms now proposed were, however, obvious to all eycept the incurably homesick, and the younger generation in particular were able to aporeciate the better economic, social and eaucational opportunities to which they, and their chilaren, would fall heir.
5. Few notive races are more able than the Bancbans to appreciete on which side of their bread thebutter Jiss and I was not. surprised to find that, after the small but vocal minority of sentimentalists had tried, and railed, to gain their point, the cormanity settled down to their time-honoured technique of using the Goverment's latest proposals (as set out in the "Statement of Intentions") as a leves to cain further concessions and a yet Iareer measure of control over their finds.

The relative
cenerosity of the new uoljey clearly surprised them; but it was not lone before more than one sneaker hau made it plain that, while acceptable as a step fownad, the proposals did not as yet meet fully the demands of at least a section of the community.
6. 'ihese ul.timate dernonds, as detailed by individuel speakers, may be sumbinized as follons:-
(1) the capital, as well os the interest, stanaing to the credit of each owner in the Jandholders fund should be handed over to theowner for investment or disposal at his or her absolute discretion;
(2) all future royalties payable to the Royalties rrust Fund should be divided amons the owners of the surface rights, if possible in proportion to the volume of phosphate taken off each land, again for investment or disposal at his or her discretion; and
(3) any balance lying in the Royalty Trust Fund after the erection of the necessary. cormunal and other buildings on Rabi and the completion of the related public works programe should de divided among the existing memoers of the cormunity. The provident lund would be, of course, used primarily for the above purpose but it was recognized that it will probably prove insufficient without assistance fron the Royalty l'rust fund.
7. These demands were admitted by the Banabans themselves to be based on self-interest and framed regaraless of the welfare of succeeding generations. the proposal as to the division of the capital in the Landholaers Fund is, furthemore, contrary to Banaban customary law while those relating to the Royalty 'imust and Provident Funds are in ooposition to the policy hitherto adooted by the Government of regarding royalties from under-surface rights as being the property of the conranity as a whole rather than the indiviaual ovners of surface rights (vide, in this connexion, paragraphs $20-23$ of my main memo-
randum). randum).
8. With the settlement of Rabi, however, the Banaban arguments for exclusive and unfettered control over his own funds, as sumarized below, will ie creatly strengthened. Is regards the Landholders Fund the Banaban recognizes that each capital deoosit represents, in monetary form, the land formeriy possessed by him and that, while he was living on Ocean Island itself, he could not logically expect to be able to syend it contrary to Banaben customary law regulating the inheritance of land. He points out, however, that the object of this restriction was to ensure that his descendants would, even ir they no longer possessed any land, still enjoy an income from the interest on the capital representing fiejr former holdings. Nov, however, that he will possess his own landholaings on Rabi (bigger and better than any he had on Ocean Islana), which he can and must pass on to his children in accordance with Banaban cusiom, he considers that the whole object of the Iandholders Fund has ceased and that he should be allowed to have the free use of both the capital and interest in it.
9. Regaraing royalties (whether new or already invested In the Royalty rust) the Banaban argues, as he has always done, that all undersurface richts belong aiosolutely to the owners of thesurface richts and that the Government has no rictht to withhold his royalty payments, which shoula be paid to each individual landowner and not diverted to communal use. A majority of thebmabans would except the payment of 2 d per ton made to the provident aund for the purchase and development of Raipi as their commulty home, since this vas oricinally agreed to by the peonde, but an increasing minority of the youncor men would have this stum also divided up and all development and
10. The attitude taken by ir. macdonald and myself to the Banaban demands was to the effect that we were not empowered to discuss such a drastic arnenoment of policy and that, in envy case, we. were of the strong opinion that the time for theirdiscussjon was not now, when so much effort and expenditure was required for the setting up and development of their new home and it was quite impossible to forecast whet percentage of the provident and Royalty Trust Funds would be needed before the works was complete. Once their public buildings, schools, churches, roads and other community requirements had been met it would be possible for the Banaban Fund Trust Board (who are elected by themselves) to recommend such division of trust Funds as they thought best.
11. In the case of the Landholders Fund we agreed to recommend to Your Excellency that individual landholders should be, permitted, with your prior sanction in each instance, to withdraw part or the whole of their capital investment for the purpose of effecting permanent improvements to their new landiolaincs on Rabi. Further than this very reasonable concession ye were not prepared to go, since it was obvious that the majority at any rate of the younger Banatoans vianted to be given their capital to waste on a few months of riotous and extravagant living, quite regardless (as they admj.tted themselves) of the rights or welfare of succeeding generations. past experience confirms the powers of the Bgnabans to get rid of large capital sums in a few months, for in nothing left to handed $£ 7,000$ and within a short period had nothing left to show for it.
12. Once everybody had had their say and every quite prepared to acre to:-
(I) the holding of a secret ballot to establish whether the majority of the community desired to make Raid theirfuture home or return to Ocean Island; and
(2). if the veraict was in favour of staying on Rabi, to agree to the terms governing the control of their lands and funds, and other incidental matters, as set out in the Government "Statement of Intentions".
The secret ballot vas accordingly held on the lath and ll th May with the following result, no less than 318 ( $94.6 \%$ ) out of the' 336 of the population over the age of 18 voting. -
(1) For making Rabi the Banaban homeland ${ }^{\prime}=270$ ( $84.9 \%$ )
(2) Against making Rabi the Banaban homeland - 48 (15.15\%)

## (3) Majority in favour - 222

The "Statement of Intentions" was thereupon unenirnously approved and signed by all parties on the 12 th bay.
13. In this satisfactory solving of a series of complex: problems concerning Banaban lands and funds, which have been a thor in the flesh of the administration for some 30 years, much credit is due to the present Administrative officer in charge of their affairs, injor Holland, who for many months had been encased in patient explanation and tactful propaganda with this end in view. So marked was the change in the spirit. of the community (and no less in its material state) since my last

Iast visit a year previously that I have littla downt that ajor Holland, who obviously had the confidence of the commity and their velfere at heart, could have brourght the negotietions to a successful termination without our presence. The fact, however, that official representatives of the two Governments concerncd were present at the final proceedings may serve to prevent future misunderstanding.
14. With the decision to make Rabi their future homeland, the Banabans become, as a community, subjects of the Colony of Fiji. After discussion with Mr. hacdonald I recomend that the official date of handing over their funds and recoras to the Fiji Government should be the 3lst Decemoer, 1947 since the majority of the poople will be array encaged in boundarymarking on Ocean Islana until the end of this year and as a consequence, it will not be possible for the Bunaban Adviser to organise elections to, and the functioning of, the Island Council and Trust Fund ioard pending their return. The interval will, furthermore, give the High Cominission time to straichten out the position as regards the Banaben Fundis and hand them over with all receipts'and gayments complete to the end of the year.
15. The following details of the final action required before the management of Banaban affairs can be handed to the Fiji Government may be of assistance to the \#estern Pacific Hi.gh Commission staff. -

A complete tabular sumiary of all revenue and expenditure from Banaban iunds year by year from the beginning (either by calendar or financial years, whichever is the easier) should be prepared and fomarded to the Janaban Adviser, for the information of the Islana Council, as promised to the community. This statement need not give detej.: of each item of expenditure but only the service on which it was incurred, e.g. drought relief, upheep of hospital, annuities, etc., ana the revenue need oniy show each fund separately, not each payment.
(2) A complete statement, which would presumaibly be based on (I), showing the position of each Banaban Fund as at the 3Ist December, 1914.
(3) Any necessary action to amend the Gilbert and Rllice Islanas Colony legislation in the event of Your Excellency aporoving the recomimenation contained in paragraph il. Sjpeaking without the recoras, it appears to me that no action is, in fact, required, since the Ocean Island lands code has never ibeen gazetted in accordance with the provisions of the Native Land Codes Ordinance, 1940.
once the above action is completed, it only remains to hand over the actual funds, files and records to a representative of the wiji Government, presumbly during the first week in January. It is necessary to emphasize, however, that the sum ary required at (I) cannot be prepared by the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colonv, whose records nave all becin destroyed by eneny action, but that the information is available in the Ifigh comission office. It is sugeested that it is usizal for Govermants to farnish details of the expenditure they incare from the cunds entrusted to their care and that the fact that the Banabans have never been given any such statements in the past should not be allowed to prevent one being prepared for then now, even though j.t may mean the temporary employment of an extra officer to extract the necessary facts and figures.
16. With this letter I must perfores, and with feclings of genuine regret, close nearly 20 years of association with the Banaban commaity, during which perjod I have develoned a great admiration for their many sterling qualitics. by secent visit to Rabi Island has convinced me that now they have decided to settle down in a locality where tinejr indusiry, perseverance and ruged indj.vidualism can be given fuln scope, they are destined to procress rapidy in every sphere of activi.ty. They will, hovever, require much sympathetic advice and assistance for some time to come, and it is to be hoped, therefore, that they may find as many firm friends in the future amone officers of the Fiji Government as they have anong. the Gilbert and Ellice Islands Colony staff in the past.

The British Phosphate Commissioners area that if practicable it would be wise to，purchase the whole oi s the land they require on the general line proposed by Ni ．lade；wad in these circumstances a representative of the Comissioners，viz：is．Ho Bojevnara，was sent En perch 1947 to Rabi Island， where the Bmaoans are now located，in order to dicuass the question with the Banabans．He mas able，after telegraphic communication with the Phosphate Commissioners，to sign on Agreement on the 何h April for the purchase of 291 acres on Ocean Island above the $170^{\circ}$ contour and 380 acres below that level on the following terms：

Price per acre above $170^{\circ}$ contour including coconut and
Price below 170＇contour The land purchased is estimated to contain about $7 \frac{3}{4}$ million tons of phosphate． 3．The total purchase price， 232,900 ，is being held by the Camissioners for the credit oi f the Bonbons at jot interest from 17th April 194．7，because the marking of the boundaries and allocation of the money to individual londormers will take come considerable time．A boundary marlins party of about 4,50 Benabans will be taken to and returned from Ocean Island and maintained whilst there at the expense of the Commissioners．

If terns for phosphate land were agreed with them it would have a considerable bearing on their willingness to remain at Rabid. I doubt very much whether an affirmative vote for settlement at Rabi can be ooteined without the prior settlement of Ocean Island land terms, and lir. liaynard shares this view.
