

dence that there is a great demand for land in this State. Settling Vacant Land.

"As successful land settlement will depend largely upon transport and water facilities, my Government has invited the Public Works Standing Committee to enquire whether it is practicable to provide these facilities for certain large areas of land, now unoccupied. These areas include 218,000 acres in the Counties of Buxton, Bosanquet, and Le Hunte, on Eyre Peninsula; 175,000 acres in the County of Way, 55,661 acres already surveyed on Eyre Peninsula, and 384,000 acres north of the River Murray in the counties of Young and Hamley. The Committee has been asked also to enquire into a proposal for settling a large area near Keith, in the South-East, of which a preliminary survey is now being made.

"My Ministers are anxious to receive the report of the Committee on these matters sufficiently early to enable them to proceed during the coming financial year with works which will develop the land to which I have referred. Should the report be favorable, it is anticipated that the Commonwealth Development and Migration Commission will co-operate with the State to bring about the occupation and utilisation of this land.

"My Government has further augmented the staff of agricultural instructors. The officers of the Department of Agriculture are using every effort to induce producers to aim at the greatest possible production. Given adequate rains during the forthcoming season, there is every reason to hope for a greatly increased yield.

"The erection of an Agricultural High School at Urrbrae on land given for that purpose by Mr. Peter Waite will be proceeded with. The members of my Government acknowledge with gratitude the generosity of Mr. John Melrose, who gave £10,000 towards the construction of a research laboratory at the Walte Agricultural Research Institute.

Education.

"My Government is anxious to effect further improvements in our educational system. A scheme to give vocational guidance to parents and assist children to find suitable employment will be organised.


