

SECONDARY EDUCATION OUTSTRIPS POPULATION

But Growth Natural, Says Education Authority

DR. DAVIES ADVOCATES TEST**Reply To Taxpayers' Association****Wants Impartial Adjudicator**

Dr. L. Harold Davies (Director of Education, University of Melbourne, Victoria) writes:—It is understood that Adelaide City Council will on Monday make the appointment of a salaried City Organist.

Many people and citizens interested in the selection of a successor to Mr. W. R. Knox have every right to assume that steps are being taken to ascertain what shall be given full opportunity to prove their fitness.

Letter to Lord Mayor

Having this in mind I have addressed the following letter to Mr. J. V. M. (Lord Mayor):—

"It may be that my suggestion should

not have been made earlier, but I naturally

expected that such a course as this would

be adopted, and as the council has not yet made the appointment I trust that it

may not be too late to give effect to the

same suggestion.

Decision on Mandate

To this the Lord Mayor has replied as follows:—

"I have to acknowledge receipt of your

letter and to thank you for your suggestion.

The matter has been already considered in committee, and it is the next

course of action to be taken at the next

council meeting on Monday, when the

decision will be announced."

In conclusion, says Dr. Davies,

"I wish to express my own hope, that

the Government will yet decide to adopt the

course here suggested, more especially as

the council themselves would certainly

not be able to afford the sum required.

COSTS 60 PER CENT OF TAX

As the monthly bulletin of the Taxpayers' Association says, "There is no quarrel with

The bulletin points out that in 1900 the

cost of education was 8.3 per head of population in South Australia, but last year it was £14.60.

From income tax the Government collected £12/2 per head of population, and thus we see such a decision.

COST NOT SO GREAT

If the spending of £30,000 on secondary

education were abolished the taxpayer would only be saved £3," said the President of the Teachers' Union (Mr. G. Charlesworth) last night.

"The Commonwealth Year Book shows that in 1923 the expenditure on secondary education in South Australia was £2/11. In

1923 it was £2/5—an increase of £4 per head in three years.

"The same authority shows that for secondary

education West Australia spent £10.30, Victoria 3/9, New South Wales 3/6, Queensland 2/6, and Tasmania 1/2 a head of the population in 1923.

Only Queensland and Tasmania spent less than South Australia on secondary education.

UNIVERSITY FIGURES

Mr. Charlesworth said that expenditure on University education provided material for thought.

The Government grants to the University and the public £1/8 a head, which was more than half the expenditure on the whole of the high school system for less than half the number of students.

"The grants to the University had increased by 25 per cent in the past four years, one student cost £49.14, in 1920, which included £24.90, while the Government funding increased by 34/6 per cent, the Government funding £34/6 per student, about the increase of this expense has been made by the Taxpayers' Association.
