





Criminal Jurisdiction

In the matter of a charge against James Christian.

The charge (as on the charge form) was duly read to the accused  
who thereupon pleaded NOT GUILTY.

Case for the Prosecutor.

Arthur Herbert Young, - sworn, - states. "On the 2<sup>nd</sup> February, 1941, I instructed the constable Burnett Christian to place James Christian in gaol at 6 p.m. on Friday. He was under a Court sentence for taking some of Allen's things. His sentence was 1 month and 5 days infusorial. The date of the Courts' sentence was some 6 or 7 days before the 2<sup>nd</sup> February. However, as the gaol was filled with Mr Mandeville's effects and we thought that a ship would be calling in one or two days so I as Chief magistrate postponed the sentence till further orders."

As I arrived. I did not think it of interest to inform the relatives. I told ~~Mr~~ <sup>Mr.</sup> Burnett Christian to go up to the house and ~~Mr~~ tell him to get ready his things.

Bennett Christian, sworn, states - "I was ride ther side of the chief magistrate to arrest the accused. I told him in the morning when the bell rung that he was going to prison that afternoon - To get his things ready & we'll take him the same time. He began to curse and swear but I did not pay any attention. I told Calvert said that I'd need his help. I waited for him when we went to take him the trouble started.

He tried to prevent me from taking him. He tried to fight us. He was violent so we had to take him by force. He tore my shirt and bit me and tried to knife me."

Asd of accused. I do not remember laying you on the ground. That must have been the time we carried him. John Stradde.

a D.C. for the n.P. with jurisdiction in the P.I. District.

Calvert Warren, sworn, states - "I was carrying for the bell & met Bennett at Ladd's & he told me he needed help. I ask him to come back. He was trying to get away up a hill. He told me he was not going back. He was going up the hill. So I asked him to come back. He came & set to his horse with me. I asked him to stay for a mate. He wouldn't obey. He went as far as Davis' kitchen of the road & stopped. So I brought him back to the workshop & asked him to keep quiet.

He then came and kicked me, so I grabbed him & with Lucy's help tried to keep him quiet. So we had to take him by force, as when I asked him to come over to the prison he refused to walk. So we carried him. He was trying to struggle and kick but couldn't do very much.

xd of cont. He was struggling ad violent of the rage trees.

The accused waived his right of cross-examination.

In giving this sentence the Court has taken into account the fact that the accused appears to be of an excitable and unbalanced temperament and recommends that he should be examined by a qualified medical specialist on opportunity occurring.
