The Scholarship will provide 18-year-old Brendan, who is undertaking his first year of study in the Batchelor of Agriculture degree at Roseworthy Campus, with full residential support.

The Scholarship was presented to Brendan by the Co-patron Chairman of the Roseworthy Campus and Student Fund, The Hon Dr Bruce Eastick AM, and ROCA President Locky McLaren at a luncheon convened recently by Rural Media South Australia.



The Scholarship is in memory of Trevor Dillon who, through his work as an agronomist with the SA Department of Agriculture, and in his retirement period as a part-time consultant, focussed on encouraging future and up-and-coming grass-roots farmers, young agronomists and students looking to embark on a long career path within agriculture. Over a period of five decades he was one of the State's most respected and high-profile advocates for excellence in farming practice.

According to ROCA President, Locky McLaren, the State's rural sector, following Trevor Dillon's death last year, was overwhelming in its support for the creation of a scholarship that would assist young people become leaders in practical agriculture.


"This is particularly relevant as an honour to Trevor Dillon as it was the financial assistance provided by Legacy following the death of his father in the Second World War's El Alamein campaign that permitted Trevor to study agriculture at Roseworthy during the 1950s," Locky said.

Sub-committees have also been established to represent key interest groups – Natural Resources, Staff Reunion and Oenology.
