From 1912 to 1913 he was president of the S.A. branch of the Returned Sailors and Soldiers' Imperial League, which he induced to contest the Imperial election bids, for the Boothby seat of the House of Representatives. Lieutenant-Colonel McCordie, M.P., was associated with returned soldiers' connections, and in 1923 visited England as Australia's senior representative at the Imperial Conference of the British Empire Service League. Recently he filled the position of Acting City Coroner.

**Dr. Helen Mayo, O.B.E.**  
Dr. Helen Mayo was born in Adelaide in 1873. She graduated M.B., B.S. at the Adelaide University in 1902.

She was granted the degree of M.D. in 1926. She did post-graduate work in England and Ireland after a year at the Adelaide University. She was one of the founders of the Mothers' and Babies' Health League, which was instituted in 1909. In 1912 she was appointed clinical bacteriologist in charge of a vaccine department at the Adelaide Hospital. In 1913 she was subsequently added. Dr. Mayo held that position until 1923, when she resigned. In 1913, with Miss Harri Stirling, she was the founder of the hospital which resulted in the establishment of the Maresca Babies Hospital, to which institution she is now honorary consulting physician and medical officer. In 1914 she was elected a member of the Adelaide University Council, and is a member of the Executive Committee to the governing body of a university in the Empire. She was appointed honorary physician to the Adelaide Children's Hospital in 1917, and a clinical lecturer of diseases of children to the Adelaide University. She resigned from the Adelaide University last year. Dr. Mayo is the founder of the Adelaide Lyceum Club.

**Miss Kate Coombs, M.B.E.**  
Miss Fanny Kate Bondiea Coombs was born at Moonia on May 5, 1875. At an early age she was sent to the Quorn, where she received her schooling, and then began her career as a teacher. After the Education Department for a brief period Miss Coombs came to Adelaide to take up a position as a teacher in the Department, becoming the first probation officer for South Australia for the Women's Council, after having been with the Department for 15 years. In 1915 she was appointed to take charge of the women police, which was the first of its kind in the world, since each member was attached to the police force with full powers. This position she held in this position continuously, and most successfully until May 11 last, when her official term of office expired.

**H. E. Whittle, M.B.E.**  
Mr. Harold Edgar Whittle was born at Milington in 1869, and joined the Government as a junior clerk at the artillery at the age of 18. Two and a half years later he entered the Prisons Department as a warder at Yatala. This position he held until he joined the police force in 1898. He was found to be valuable in assisting in the catching of criminals, and in 1900 he was promoted to sergeant. This position he held during the following nine years and was responsible for clearing up many crimes. For three years from 1910 he was in charge of the Criminal Investigation staff, when he did a great deal of work for the Commonwealth Government. In 1922 he was promoted to the rank of Inspector. He received the appointment of Comptroller of Prisons, the position he now holds, in 1922.

**Mr. E. H. Cornish, I.S.O.**  
Mr. E. H. Cornish, who is Commissioner of Taxation, holds a unique record in the Civil Service. He has been 50 years in the Public Department, which he entered as a junior clerk on January 6, 1885. Mr. Cornish was born at Walkerville, and his son of the same name, Mr. E. H. Cornish, formerly secretary to the Department of the Attorney-General. After having been editor of the "Adelaide Advertiser" he entered the warehouse of Goods Bros., and from that firm he transferred to the office of the Minister of Education, which he entered as a clerk in 1922. From there he went to the Land and Income Tax Department. He was then transferred to the Public Department. His ability carried him forward in the service, and in 1911 he was appointed Deputy-Commissioner of Prisons, and in 1912 Controller of stamp duty and land and income tax were separated in 1916. Mr. Cornish was appointed Commissioner of Stamps and Mr. R. W. Smith Commissioner of Taxes. On Mr. Smith's retirement in 1924, the Stamp Duty and Land and Income Tax Department

ments were amalgamated, and Mr. Cornish was appointed Commissioner of Prisons. He holds the diploma of Associate from the Institute of Actuaries of South Australia, which is the highest honor that the Institute can confer upon a member of the Civil Service. Mr. Cornish is recognised as one of the leading authorities on stamp duty law.

**Dame Constance Darcy** is one of Australia's leading gynaecologists and has delivered many important lectures on medical subjects.

**Air Vice-Marshal Williams** has been the senior officer of the Royal Australian Air Force since its formation.

**Mr. E. V. Nixon** is a prominent accountant and a member of the Royal Commission on Taxation.

**Mr. Hugh McConaghy** has had a distinguished career in the Federal Service and is now chairman of the Tariff Board.

**Mr. Ralph Abercrombie** has been Director of Naval Accounts for 30 years.

**Mrs. Ruth Fairfax** is an active New South Wales charitable worker.

**Monsignor P. X. Gell** of the Catholic Mission, Bathurst Island, has served in the north since 1905 and opened Victoria Bay in 1910, and the Bay of Bathurst Island Mission in 1911. Under his personal guidance an aerodrome was constructed on the island, and this was responsible for the safe landing of the Imperial Airways machine Aetna when it was lost recently.

**Mr. E. V. Nixon**, who has been prominent in women's movements and will be in the Australian delegation at the next session of the League of Nations Assembly.

**Dr. Georgina Sweet**, of Melbourne, has been actively associated with women's movements in all parts of Australia.

**Former N.Z. Governor-General To Be Viscount**

In view of the Silver Jubilee year of the King's reign and His Majesty's seventieth birthday, the list of birthday honors conferred is more comprehensive than usual. It contains the names of persons who have rendered eminent service in Britain and throughout the Empire in politics, industry, the professions, arts, sciences, fighting and civil service, and social work. Leading members of the Labor and Liberal Opposition and of the trade union movement figure in the list, which also includes Dr. Daniel Dufour, famous as the Dionne quintuplets doctor.

The King, who was very much better today and this morning attended the coronation ceremony at Buckingham Palace, has appointed the Prince Royal to be Colonel-in-Chief of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Duke of Gloucester, Colonel-in-Chief of the Gloucestershire Regiment, and the Duchess of York, honorary Colonel of the London Scottish Regiment.

Among the Birthday Honors are—  
**Lord Bledisloe**, former Governor-General of New Zealand, chairman and president of many Royal Commissions, and Parliamentary and other committees on agricultural and educational questions. Succeeded as Governor-General of New Zealand by Viscount Galway.

He has been a member of many Royal Commissions and other committees of enquiry into railways, dentistry and into the Royal Mint, and industrial and commercial questions. **FULL LIST OF BRITISH HONORS**

**Wider Scope Than Is Usual**

**CONTAIN FEW WOMEN**

LONDON, June 2.  
**SIX** new barons have been created in the British Birthday honors list, which as the Silver Jubilee year of the King's reign, coincides with the King's birthday.

An interesting recognition is that of Mr. John Maselfield, the Poet Laureate, who is the first of the century's poets to be awarded the Order of Merit. The list, although not particularly imaginative, reflects all sides of national life, including the Manchester Guardian in a leading article.

It is strikingly non-party, but women have some ground for criticism, because only three Dames and a special baroness have been named in all, allowance, says the article.

The King has appointed the Princess Royal (Princess Mary) colonel-in-chief of the Royal Corps of Signals, the Duke of Gloucester, colonel-in-chief of the Gloucestershire Regiment, and the Duchess of York, honorary colonel of the London Scottish Regiment.
