## National Union to act on Com. Scholarships

This year as in other years, N.U.A.U.S. has received many complaints from students on the inadequacy of the present Scholarship scheme.

First instituted in 1951, the Scheme was designed with the expressed aim of providing a capable student, regardless of income, with the opportunity of gaining a higher education.

Undoubtedly it has helped many talented students from

families on a lower income, to enter the professional ranks, but, after discussing the Scheme with a number of scholars it has become very obvious that the scheme has failed to carry out the original ideal of "reducing the inequalities of educational opportunity at the tertional opportunity at the ter-tiary level."

The present policy of the Universities' Commission has been criticised in particular with regard to the "living" allowance under the scheme. Students who are forced to see this assistance complain that the present rate and me-thod of computation is quite out of touch with all reasonable requirements.

Numbers of students have been forced to borrow from the students' loan fund in to supplement the grant.

#### Cases of Special Hardship.

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One student is particularly unfortunate. His mother receives a widow's pension, and his younger brother is at school. In order to help financially he has taken an evening job which gives him £3/3/0 per week; he also holds a bursary which is valued at about 19/- a week.

The effect on his allowance is that he is only 15/- better off than he would be if he were doing nothing at all. It would certainly be understandable if the student failed to disclose his earnings, for the present regulations do not encourage honesty.

Cases such as this are not uncommon, and many students have just grievances. It is high time the original scheme was revised and its present inadequacies rectified.

#### What is National Union Doing?

National Union makes an annual submission on the Scholarship Scheme to the Universities Commission and over the years have obtained modifications in the scheme for students.

#### Will You Help?

In order to base the N.U.A.U.S. submission on the maximum of factual informamaximum of factual information, we appeal to all students to forward opinions and suggestions on the scheme, and cases of hardship, to your local S.R.C. The full support and cooperation of all students is necessary if changes are to be effected. We need your help!

### NUAUS find Funds for Goodwill Tours

In recent weeks Trust Funds have been set up on behalf of National Union which will be available as finance for future delegations and goodwill tours.

These trust funds are being set up in two main ways. The Argus newspaper of Melbourne, which so generously ran an appeal last year which enabled us to send a delegation of students to Malaya and Indonesia last January, has agreed to make a further appeal this year for money to be spent on similar delegations to South East Asia. When Dr. Russo of the Argus returns to Australia this month from an extensive tour of Asia, he intends to proceed immediately with the arrangements for this appeal.

However, the N.U.A.U.S. Council decided at its meeting in Adelaide that side by side with the Argus appeal there should be another Trust Fund set up in Sydney and a Trust Committee with Sir Bertram Stevens as Convenor, and with David Teplitzky, President of N.U.A.U.S.
