

Greenpeace Pacific was established at a meeting in Melbourne, Australia and its aims were endorsed at the international Greenpeace meeting in Auckland on 15th December, 1973. The aims of Greenpeace Pacific in 1974 are to:

On August 6, 1945 at 8 a.m., the United States dropped the first atomic bomb of human history on Hiroshima city. It was immediately followed by the second bomb- Archipelago is their territory and the popuing on Nagasaki on August 9. With strange flash and thunderous explosion, the two cities were destroyed into a heap of rubble in a moment. In Hiroshima, the epicentre was burned by intense heat rays of 3,000 to 4,000 degrees centigrade and was exploded by a pressure of 12 kg to the centiare . . . The number of deaths to date of both cities including persons killed outright and later has been estimated at more than 300,000 and that of the wounded in several hundreds of thousands . . . As we experienced such a bitter disaster, our people wish no more Hiroshimas or Nagasakis. However contrary to our wishes, the nuclear development race has been accelerated to the extent that there are stock piled enough nuclear weapons to kill mankind ten times over. It should be noted that the bombs dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki were of the 0.2 megaton stronger offensive with survivors of Hiro class, or less than one fifth in their destruc- shima and Nagasaki at the centre. In order tive power of the hydrogen bombs tested by France . . . Therefore we believe that the struggle for the complete abolition of nuclear weapons is the sole way for the survival of manking...

It may be an act of racist discrimination that France selected Mururoa as their testing site on the grounds that the Tuamotu lations on the islands is small. The Frence have no right to make such a hazard and to destroy the civilization and economy of the Polynesian people by flow of army, scientists and engineers into their land. It is the same as the U.S. did to Micronesia because their population was only 100,000. Micronesia is now controlled by the U.S. as their essential strategic trust territory with a huge airport and nuclear storage places, and bases and an ABM testing site. Both Polynesians and Micronesians are stripped of their right to self-determination. We have to support their movement for independence and discourage the French military's control there ...



BACKGROUND TO THE MIDDLE EAST AUS RESOLUTIONS

I am very much con-erned over the AUS cerned resolutions of Council of January 1974. It seems to me that they are based upon a distorted, biased, ignorant and dangerous view of the Middle East situation.

Every thinking person must be aware that there are 2 sides to the Middle East question. However the AUS resolutions admit of only one, proposing as they do the genocide of 3 million Jews, and politicide of the Jewish people by the destruction of the state of Israel.

For resolution one states that AUS does not recognise the existence of the State of Israel (And hence does not recognise the National Union of Israeli Students as an official student union).

.Resolution two claims that Israel is in reality occupied Palestine.

Not to recognise that the State of Israel exists is as silly as not recognising Red China. If a country exists it exists, every country in the world has at some time not existed. Most countries have been founded in controversy. Since however AUS insists on pushing the claims of Palestine, let us for a change look at the histori-! cal realities - for while the Palestinian refugees are in a piteous state, if one looks at history one sees that it is NOT Israel who should be blamed.

. . In the year 70 the Jewish state of Judea was destroyed, and imperial Rome introduced the name Palestine to replace Judea. Since then the country has never been a separate national entity but always occupied.

For three centuries prior to 1918 it was ruled by various provinces belonging to the Ottoman Turks, and then remained under British occupation and mandate till 1948.

Even in May 1947 Arab representatives at the UN general assembly stated that:

This country was Israel for in all their expulsion the Jews had never ceased to perceive of themselves as a national entity with Israel as their land (and infact there has always been a continuous Jewish population in Israel), they had never fully assimilated. So the movement to return to the holy land, to Zion, was called Zionism, It was a Jewish liberation movement. Moreover it was based upon strict labour principles — upon the idea that the Jews had become an abnormal people in that being, restricted to certain professions (e.g. (e,g. in the moneylenders) countries in which they had lived, the Jewish people no longer covered a normal spectrum of occupations. For instance there were no

Jewish farmers. So Zionism was a back to the land movement for the Jews, doctors emigrated to Palestine, and worked in the fields, Zionism was a self-conscious attempt to normalist the Jewish people, to liberate them. Hence such co-operatives as the kibbutzim, the fact that Israel is today a democratic socialist state.

So a significant Jewish emigration to Palestine commenced just prior to the 1920's, joining those Jews already settled there. What was the reactions of the Arab Palestinians at the time? (There were of course also Jewish Palestinians, there having been continuous Jewish habitation since B.C. 1300. Well, under succeeding occupiers Palestine as a country had degenerated to deserts, malarial marshes and eroded hills. By the 20th century the number of villages in the area had degenerated to half of what it had been three hundred years earlier.

Thus, when a significant Jewish emigration to Palestine commenced, a number of Arab leaders saw the Jewish return as a benefit to the whole area. So Emir Feisal signed an agreement with Dr. Chaim Weizmann the Zionist leader on Jan. 3rd, 1919, which stated that

. . mindful of the raclal kinship and ancient bonds existing between the Arabs and the Jewish people, I realise that the surest means of working out the consummation of their national aspirations is through the closest possible collaboration in development of the Arab state and Palestine, and being further desirous of confirming the good under-

It is a pity that today's Arab leaders can not be so sensible, or considerate of their people.

When the manifesto of the Palestinian terrorist organisations calls for the exputsion of all Jews who came to Palestine after 1917, they seem to forget that that is when most of the Arabs came too - after 1917. For the regeneration of Palestine and the increase in Arab population both began in the 1920's with the growth of Jewish emigration and under the impact of Jewish agricultural development. Arabs prospered because of the better facilities and economic conditions created by Jewish emigration, and Palestine itself changed from a country of Arab emigration to one of Arab im-migration! From 1922 Arabs began migrating to

Palestine from Syria, Iran, Lebanon, Transjordan and

Egypt. Now when we speak of Jels migrating to Palestine was only in fact a to that after 1922 this Palestine was only in fact. small fraction of actual Palestine. For in 1922 the British gave ap-proximately 70 per cent of Palestine to be what is known today as Jordan (and this does not include the West Bank). 70 per cent of the population of Jordan are today Palestinians. So most of Palestine is in fact Arab owned!!!!!

Anyway we now come to the Palestinian refugee problem. I must thank the reader for his patience so far, but one cannot judge the Middle East today without some knowledge of

what has gone before. In 1947 what the British still possessed of Palestine was divided into two states, one Palestinian state, and one Jewish state - Israel. 70 per cent of the land given to be Israel was state land owned by the British Government, and most of this was the Negev desert.

The U.N. voted in favour of the partition — and the surrounding Arab states attacked Israel in 1948, when Israel was born,

Now Palestinian Arabs were traditionally ac-customed to temporary flight as a means of avoiding warfare. Further in 1948 Arab leaders urged the Arabs living in Israel to get out, so that the invading armies could destroy Israel.

To quote the Bulletin of the Research Group of European Migration Problems, January 1957 Migration (The Hague), pp. 10-11: "As early as the first

months of 1948 the Arab League issued orders exhorting the people to scek temporary refuge in the neighbouring countries, later to return to their abodes in the wake of the victorious Arab armies and obtain their share of a bandoned Jewish properties."

Or, as the Jordanian journal, Ad-Difaa (September 6, 1954) more succinctly put it;

"The Arab governments told us 'Get out so that we can get in' — so we got out, but they (the Arab Arab Governments) did not get in,'

So Israel survived - and there was a refugee problem. Approx. ½ a million Arabs fled Israel and where could they go? They couldn't go to the Palestinian state that had been created along with Israel -- because when the Arab states attacked Israel Egypt occupied Gaza and Jordan the West Bank most of which was sup-posed to have been an independent Palestinian

state. Now when the Araps fled Israel in 1948 Jews naturally fled Arab

people dispossessed only of Israel and by Israel — and dedicated to the violent destruction of Israel. Ignorant and miserable, the Palestinian refugees are victims of a very great and deliberate act of cruelty, and it is understandable that they have been so twisted by conditions that they readily subscribe to terrorism. All the 37 or so organisations that speak for the Palestinians subscribe to speak the Patestinian Covenant. This Covenant is a terrorist manifesto, dedicating all who subscribe to it to the destruction of the state of Israel, and denying the peoplehood, and therefore the national liberation, of

the Jewish people. While all this is understandable, and one can and must sympathise with the Palestinians in their plight, one cannot at the same time blame the Israelis, or call upon them to pay all the penalty, or in all conscience support the oil rich, ninety million or so Arabs, living on ten million square kilometres of territory, in their desire to destroy 3 million or so Jews living on territory ouc tenth of one percent of the size of the Arab territories!

The Jews too have a right to national liberation.

Before returning specifically to a discussion of the AUS resolutions there a a couple of other important points that have to be made. One concerns Arab utterances for public consumption. Of late the Arab world seems to have learned that to claim it intends to destroy Israel is not the most diplomatic thing to do. So while its utterances for external propaganda may have toned down somewhat recently one must remain aware that statements inside the countries are and that all the Palestinian organisations still subscribe to the Palestinian Covenant, which was partially described above. Further vast amounts of oil money are around for the Arabs to play with, and they are intensifying the propaganda war around the world. In the process they are trying to rewrite history, in a truly Or-wellian and Big Brother manner. Be aware that Arab propaganda is not loth to distort or straight out lie. Examples of such material have already appeared in Australia. It is distressing that

National U takes Arab propaganda as absolute truth, maintaining for instance that the Arab refugees were forced out of Israel by the Israelis when Arab sources prior to the present propaganda blitz have plainly stated that this was not the case, as you saw earlier in this paper.

NOBODY'S BUSINESS? of lies told about Jews in anti-semitic propaganda are now being told about 'the wicked Zionists'. Let me repeat again that Zionism is Jewish Zionism Liberation.

The National Union of Israeli Students (NUIS) represents students of Moslem, Christian aud Jewish persuasions who go to Universities in Israel. But what is the General Union of Palestinlan Students? Well, we do know that it was founded by Yasser Arafat - currently leader of the unashamedly terrorist organisations Al Fatah and P.L.O. G.U.P.S. is represented on the Palestinian National Council - which is the highest level of the P.L.O. It too is a signatory to the infamous Palestinian Covenant which calls for the liquidation of Israel. It is significant that the West Germany leaders of the G.U.P.S. were expelled (without official ex-planation) from West Germany directly after the Mnnich Olympic Games murders.

All this not withstanding, one feels that any dialogue, anywhere, between Israeli and Arab, or Israeli and Palestinian, is to be encouraged. So let us by all means have Arab unions in the A.S.A., but let us also have the NUIS. Must we be as stupid as the leaders of countries who refuse to recognise each others' existence?


AUS resolution four condemns the exploitation and degradation of the Palestinian people as carried out by the Arab nations and by Israel.

As I have shown previously, the Palestinian people, or at least those who left Israel, have been condemned to exploitation and degradation alright but principally by the Arab nations. AUS at least recognises that the Arab nations had some hand in it but persist in insisting that Israel should pay the penalty.

Those Arabs who listened to Jewish pleas to remain in 1948 — and there were public statements by Israel pleading with the Arabs to stay — are today full Israeli citizens, and free to vote for whom they like (including communist if they so wish) quite inlike their brethen in the surrounding Arab countries.

Resolution four, like the others, is unbalanced. What one must condemn is Arab exploitation of the Palestinians as a political tool - which has further caused the Palestinians to resort to terrorism.

Resolution five calls for AUS to open dialogue with P.LO. the an unashamedly terrorist organisation and signatory the Palestinian to Covenant.



Resolution 8 has been plainly answered by the previous part of these notes, as has resolution 9.

Resolution 10 is again unbalanced — it implies that a solution to the Middle East problem must accommodate the rights of the Palestinians. It conveniently forgets the rights of the Israelis, which must also be accommodated.

Resolution 11 calls for copies of the motions to be sent to the Minister of Foreign Affairs, the Israeli Embassy, and the P.L.O. The P.L.O. should not be encouraged, nor should any terrorist organisation.

Hence my assertion that the AUS motions on the Middle East are distorted. biased, ignorant and d a n g e r o u s . A r a b propaganda (and oll money Arab provides plenty of finance for it) is attempting to rewrite history. With the Palestiniaus, the Arabs have succeeded, aud callously created a dangerous and ruthlessly exploited tool in their attempts to destroy Israel.

With their own ignorant peoples the corrupt Arab regimes have also to a large extent succeeded as they were bound to do when you consider extracts like the following from a History Book for teacher training put out by the Egyptian Ministry of Education and Instruction;-

Prophet The enlightened us about the right way to treat them (the Jews) and succeeded finally in crushing the plots that they had planned. We must today follow this way and purify Palestine from their filth in order to bring

peace " (ARAB ISLAMIC HISTORY for third year teacher training five year program Page 48).

For overseas consumption somewhat more sophisticated propaganda is being put out, AUS is unfortunately also putting some out.

But please, you of the now generation, do not be taken in by automatic catchwords like 'liberation' and 'Palestlnian refugee'. Look at who has so mistreated the Palestinians, look at the way the Palestinians wish to 'liberate' themselves, and ask why Israel should pay with its existence. I call upon all thinking people to vote no to the AUS resolutions. And remember, according to the way AUS is con-structed, a non-vote is automatically taken as a yes vote. To vote no to the resolutions a MAJORITY OF ALL VOTES ABLE TO BE CAST must be cast as NO — or the vote is taken as a yes vote.

Let us speak now of Zionism. In a Europe clearly anti-semitic some Jews began to see that the only solution to the tragic history of the Jewish people was their own liberation movement. After 2000 years of persecution, and particularly in the 20th century, it became clear that the only way the Jews could survive was in their own country.

countries, and approximately half a million Jews fled to Israel --- vet these refugees were absorbed into Israel.

But the Arab refugees were kept in refugee camps by their brethren. In the 19 years that Egypt administered the refugee camps in the Gaza strip there was no water, sewerage or electricity laid on. The refuguees could not work in Egypt, nor become citizens. They were ruthlessly exploited as a polltical tool. They were, and are, fed only on hate and so the Arabs created the Palestinian refugees ----11/4 million people who believe themselves to be a

Resolution 7, despite the call for the freedom of 'resistance fighters' held prisoner here and there, is actually calling for the release of terrorists.

It has been suggested by Don Aitkin (National Times 2.3.74) that the Australia Party should harness the interests of the only two vested interest groups that remain -- women and children (i.e. the 18-year olds).

BARTON: There's a lot of truth in that --- it's pretty obvious. But what it presupposes is gratuitous: that those outside these two groups are not committed. I've always been more concerned with independence than with survival or security. I'm more concerned about my personal vanity than I am with my reputation, which is to say my position in society.


