Thumbs Up to Sandfons Says ANC

Trades hall - a venue more commonly associated with ALP conventions than liberation meetings - was decked out last week in traditional African National Congress colours of black, green and gold to greet 79 years old ANC Deputy President, Walter Sisulu, one of the elder statesmen of South Africa's anti-apartheid movement.

With his wife, Albertina, Deputy President of the ANC Women's League, Mr Sisulu was in Adelaide on the last stages of a 12-day tour sponsored by the Department of Foreign Affairs under a special visits program which aims to introduce Australians to world opinion makers.

Mr Sisulu's messge to the Australian people was clear - continue economic, cultural and sporting bans against South Africa.

It is a viewpoint Canberra may not wholly embrace given recent indications from Prime Minister Hawke that an end to sanctions was forseeable.

But Mr Sisulu counters that the gains of the anti-apartheid movement are built on the success of sanctions and there is still a long way to go in terms of achieving economic, social and political justice for all. Some of the institutional pillars of apartheid may have dismantled under President F.W. De Klerk's white minority government but the rationale remains the same: "Sanctions were imposed in the first place to pressure the Nationalist regime to give fundamental human rights to the people of South Africa. To give the majority of the people ... a right to vote and that has not yet been done."

In the aftermath of the Inkatha funding scandal, Mr Sisulu says the ANC perceives the De Klerk government itself as the greatest obstacle to a peaceful transition in South Africa: "It is involved in matters of violence (and) it is not attempting to bring about a peaceful and healthy situation."

The question of an interim government to lay the foundation has therefore assumed urgency in the political debate.

An alliance between the ANC, the trade union organisation COSATU and the Communist Party have devised a program to mobilise popular support to this end. In the next month or two, the ANC is looking to convene an all-party congress with the aim of establishing an interim government of national unity and Mr Sisulu is cautiously optimistic about the outcome.

And despite the uncertainty South Africa faces, he remains quietly confident about the long term future for his homeland. Despite the opinions expressed by its detractors, he says the ANC as an organisation is committed to achieving change through a political settlement. An active peace movement exists and is working to bring together De Klerk's Nationalists, Inkatha, the ANC and other groups in some form of consensus.

It may be a long and tortured process of negotiations but his message to the international community is to keep faith, maintain sanctions and "be patient with us".

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Quota System Under Review

Death of First-Come-First-Served Quotas? First-Come First-Served quotas in History for 2nd and 3rd Year subjects are likely to be abolished next year. However, the English Department is proving a tougher nut to crack.

As a result of the On Dit article earlier this year, a Working Party was created by the Faculty of Arts which has recommended that the 'first-come-first-served' system be scrapped.

The working party consisted of the Faculty of Arts Student Applications Committee (SAC) along with three students- Michael Dwyer, Justin Jarvis and Natasha Stott Despoja. Some academic members of the Working Party attempted to turn it into a whitewash by moving within 1 hour of the start of the first meeting, that the status quo largely be maintained. It appeared that some Academics considered students on Committees as irrelevant and troublesome. The student representatives argued that the F-C-F-S system was perpertrating many inequities, and lacked an educational justification.


As a result, the Working Party has suggested that the selection procedure be changed so that the major factor is academic merit, with special procedures for students with compassionate/ medical cases. The new procedures will apply to second and third year students, however, preference will be given to Level III students. First year distributions will continue to be on the F-C-F-S system for Politics and Philosophy.

The student representatives on the Working Party also argued that it was stupid to consider the mechanism for implementing the quotas, without asking whether there are good grounds for quotas themselves. Hopefully, these issues will get a hearing next year.

The Working Party's proposals look set to run into trouble, however.

Before finally going to the Faculty of Arts Committee, which has the power to implement the recommendations, the proposals have to go through the SAC, which has no student representatives.

The recommendations of the Working Party directly affect the History and English Departments. The History Dept. seems happy to swap over to the new system, but the English Dept. seemingly doesn't like the idea. As a result, it has reportedly put a recommendation straight to the SAC that the F-C-F-S system should only be slightly modified next year. By doing this, it bypasses all student reps. until the Faculty of Arts

Committee stage, by which point the proposals will be pretty much set anyway.

It would be fair to say that student concerns have been pretty comprehensively screwed over by these actions, a point which is going to be raised by the students on the Faculty Committee.

From here, what is going to happen is anyone's guess, but what is happening with the review of the F-C-F-S quota system is symptomatic of the lack of control students have over their own education.

Bad News For Students in Recent Budget

The Students' Association has condemned the Government's Budget's increase to HECS on August 22. President Natasha Stott Despoja responded to the \$144 increase believing it to be "... another manifestation of the Government's cynical and educationally bankrupt move to force the Australian Higher Education System down the narrow road of elitist tertiary education."

Ms Stott Despoja also fears that the Government would impose up-front tertiary fees in the near future "leading towards a total scrapping of any pretence of access and equity. For its own political gain the Australian Vice Chancellor's Committee (AVCC) is promoting tertiary fees as the answer to ther Higher Education System's problems but the Committee is out of step with the general opposition of students and staff members to tertiary fees."

She also believes that the Government

seems oblivious to the fact that a welleducated population can help bring Australia out of the recession, instead it seems intent on bringing about the decline of our Higher Education System.

Spaire the Roel, Spoil The Child

On Tuesday, August 27 a Report commissioned by the Australian Council for Educational Research Report whose findings show that increased financial aid to students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds would do little to encourage such students' participation in tertiary education. Instead they claim that "parents are to blame" for the poor not entering tertiary education.

Students' Association President, Natasha Stott Despoja, claims;

"I am outraged that a Labor Government-commissioned report could use social disadvantage to cover its own lack of commitment to those members of Australian society the Labor Party has traditionally represented. While it is true that the more privileged classes in our society are more likely to attend tertiary institutions, it is also true that financial hardship places a tertiary education out of the reach of those from economically disadvantaged backgrounds."

It seems the easy way out to claim that a lack of parental support lay at the crux of the inability of students from such backgrounds to participate in tertiary education.

The Report's findings demonstrate that the participation rates for women have increased, as have those for students with immigrant parents, however, a widening of the gap between students from the poorest and wealthiest backgrounds by 13% during the 1980s.

With the existence of the Higher Education Contribution Scheme and the inadeqaucy of Austudy has exacerbated the plight of the disadvantaged. When it is a struggle for those from average income backgrounds to obtain a tertiary education, how can there be any incentive for those from disadvantaged backgrounds to go on to further education? Government policies are excluding the disadvantaged from participation and such misleading Reports cannot cover up this reality.

So you see, a day on Patong Beach leaves an innocent, unhardened tourist like myself an emotional and physical wreck. Before booking this holiday I wondered why the hotel owners flaunted their swimming pools so much, with so much beautiful beach close by.

Now I know! Tomorrow I'll be relaxing by the pool.



As Steve Packer, Roseworthy Student Union President, could tell Scott SAUA representatives such as myself were instrumental in having the proposal deferred at University committee level so that Roseworthy students could air their grievances to the Dean of the Faculty. That the proposal went through the University's Executive Committee is due to the outnumbering of student representatives (2) by academic members.

Scott also blames the SAUA for lack of facilities at the former City College campus. Nice try, but the fact remains the Adelaide University Union is the service body responsible for facilities.

This year the SAUA was probably the only student organisation in the country to focus on HECS and thus disprove the notion that it is a dead issue. We held a successful General Student Meeting and invited the Federal Member for Adelaide, Bob Catley, to justify his support for HECS.

The SAUA enthusiastically and substantially supported the national AUSTUDY campaign and was chiefly responsible for obtaining the impressive media coverage the campaign received in South Australia.

I have been committed to raising the profile of the SAUA, and from the response of ordinary students it would seem that our members in general have a better understanding of the SAUA's representative role and the difference between the SAUA and the Union. The SAUA has consistently

been heard through the electronic and print media, discussing the most pressing issues this year - overcrowding, underfunding, HECS, up-front fees, student poverty, the recent Budget's effect on students, to name a few.

I have consistently made myself available to listen to student grievances, both as part of the successful Campaign Complain and on a more personal level in advocating for individual cases where students have experienced problems with the University bureaucracy, individual staff members, and so forth.

The work of the SAUA covers too much ground to list here, so I extend an invitation to Scott and any other student to visit me in the SAUA Office and discuss with me my work and that of the SAUA.

KANGAROO COURTS, THEFT AND IGNORANCE Just Another SAUA Council Meeting

SAUA Office-Bearers have made yet another childish attack on freedom of the press.

The difference this time is that the person breaching the rules has tried to stifle debate on the subject by continually threatening legal action. And judging by the last SAUA Council meeting, her tactics seem to be working.

As reported in the letters pages in the 12 August edition of On Dit, SAUA Councillor Misha Schubert illicitly gained access to an On Dit letter to be published in that edition, and then proceeded to threaten to sue the newspaper unless a letter which referred to

her was removed.

Her actions breached s. 45 of the SAUA Constitution, which states On Dit Editors shall have complete and unfettered Editorial discretion, restricted only by the requirement that they present to the Association's Solicitors, via the President, material which may be defamatory.

This matter was raised at a SAUA Council meeting on 14 August.

During the course of the meeting, Councillor Misha Schubert attempted to defend herself by threatening to sue individuals or the Association on four separate occasions.

The motion which attracted most debate at the meeting was put by FVP Kamal Farouque, and read:

That the Students' Association is committed to maintaining the privacy and discretion of all users of SAUA computing and laserwriting facilities whether they be staff, office bearers, student media or general students and that the illicit use of On Dit material from the SAUA laserwriter by the Students' Association Councillor Misha Schubert be condemned as unacceptable behaviour.

After several minutes debate on the subject, and three threats of legal action by Ms. Schubert- one against Kamal Farouque, one against On Dit Editor David Krantz and one against the Association in general-Acting President Susie O'Brien chose to rule the word "illicit" out of order.

This alteration seemed acceptable to Mr. Farouque, and so, flushed by her earlier success, Ms. O'Brien went on to rule the entire motion out of order. It is normal procedure for the chair to rule motions out of order only when they are first put.

Ms. O'Brien's justification for the delay was that "she was inexperienced in dealing with issues such as this, and wanted time to work something out."

What she eventually managed to 'work out' was that any motion condemning Misha Schubert must be out of order because there was no 'proof' against her. The argument ran that because no-one saw Ms. Schubert stealing the copy, any motion claiming she had done anything wrong was out of order.

This ruling was not only wrong, it was wrong to buggery. It is offensive to simple common sense as much as meeting procedure, and shows up the Acting President as someone prepared to act to stifle debate purely on the basis of ignorance.

The scenario it creates is brilliant, though: every motion on a matter of conjecture must be ruled out of order unless compelling proof supporting the motion is put before Council.

A wonderful example was provided later in the meeting: Resolution 13 passed at the meeting asked the Adelaide Uni. Vice Chancellor to "publicly convey the University of Adelaide students' and staff members' grave concern with and opposition to the Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee's pro-fees stance".

This motion, using Susie's new rules, should have been ruled out of order. Why? No proof was put before Council that

her New Rules to go ahead? Seemingly because the resolution didn't criticise anyone present at the meeting, and no-one from the AVCC had made empty threats to sue the SAUA.

The idea of only being allowed to put motions which can be proven correct is fascinating, and would be great in the sense that it would cut the length of SAUA meetings by about 70%. However, it seems that this new meeting procedure is only enforced when an Independent is under attack.

Misha Schubert's threats of action for defamation were, of course, hopelessly ignorant. This is scarcely surprising. However, for the Chair of a meeting to act on them despite her confessed lack of knowledge of the law is outrageous.

A statement does not become more or less defamatory because it is passed by Council. If Ms. Schubert was desperate to sue, then why hasn't she sued on the basis of the minutes which were published and contained accusations against her? Why didn't Susie O'Brien stop the minutes from being published if she thought they would leave the SAUA open to litigation?

The issue of 'proof' which the Independents picked up on so enthusiastically is also a complete red herring.

If Misha was to sue the SAUA, whether or not she succeeded in defamation would not depend on whether anyone photographed her stealing copy, but who gave the most credible version of events.

The undisputed facts are that:

- Misha had illicitly gained knowledge of the contents of the letter;
- The printed layout was left in the SAUA LaserWriter overnight on Saturday;
 and
- The same layout had mysteriously found its way under the door of the On Dit office by Sunday morning without help from anyone working on the paper.

supposed to be bound by rules can interpret the rules however they like as they go along. If a President wants to interpret black as white, then there is nothing to stop him/ her, provided s/he has the numbers on Council. This happens all the time.

For example, Susie O'Bnen's belief that "the SAUA President had the right to check the copy for defamatory material." This is plainly wrong. The only restriction on Editorial discretion is that potentially defamatory material must be referred to the SAUA Solicitors via the President. The President has no discretionary powers unless the SAUA Solicitors cannot give an opinion in time.

The reason she used to back up this reading of the SAUA Constitution was that

"it was the President who was going to be sued" as she was the publisher. Section 48.1 states that the On Dit Editors are the publishers. The President is never threatened with defamation actions, simply because people hold On Dit Editors personally responsible for what is published, and the Association itself has the most money.

So, ultimately, the Constitution is scarcely worth the paper it's written on if a group of people corrupt or gullible enough get into power. This has been proven time and time again with previous Labor and Liberal administrations. The only distinguishing feature of the current Independent overlords is that they have a better logo.

So, what is the conclusion? It's true that all alternative administrations have been equally corrupt and self-serving, but any hope for a 'third way' which the Independents offered must have well and truly dissipated by now. As a non-voting student commented last week, "Student pollies? They've forgotten the reason why they came to Uni."


students could care less about the AVCC's stance on fees, and SAUA Council presuming to speak on behalf of AU staff without the slightest scrap of evidence would be nothing short of negligent. Council's interpretation of the AVCC report was not given any substantiation, and to quote Ms. Schubert's earlier contribution to debate, "you could not go around simply accusing people... without giving the person concerned a proper chance to defend themselves." The AVCC were given no chance to defend themselves before the motion was passed. In fact, there was no recorded debate at all. Why did Susie allow this flagrant breach of

Given these facts, I wouldn't like her chances. In fact, she would be laughed out of a courtroom. Why, then, did Ms. O'Brien say "that she had reason to believe that both motions could be defamatory"? Because Misha Schubert, with no legal training and less knowledge, said they were?

And so we return to the basic problem of ignorance. Ironically, Misha Schubert almost hit the nail on the head when she claimed that "Council was not a kangaroo court."

It is, and always will be. None of the checks and balances necessary for responsible government exist. The politicians who are

Sexual Harassment

The most commonly asked questions of

me in my position as Women's Officer, when discussing sexual harassment, is how many complaints I get, or women I see with complaints of sexual harassment. Let's face it, most students do need starting facts and figures to convince them that sexual harassment is an important issue at Adelaide Uni. What this campaign aims to address, is the fact that most sexual harassment goes unreported, for a variety of pertinent reasons.

Sexual harassment is most serious when it happens by someone who has power over you (ie. boss, tutor, lecturer) and as such, some of us are too intimidated and scared to speak out - particularly if we feel our grades or assessment are likely to suffer as a result.

Whilst anyone can be sexually harassed, sexual harassment against women is a way of reinforcing women's unequal position of power in society, by insisting that women be 'sexually available' for men's comments, advances and attention at all times.

Women have been conditioned to believe that some forms of sexual harassment are just 'natural', or that it is a genuine compliment. To complain is just being trivial or 'making a fuss about nothing'. Often the complainant may be made to feel that they've got no sense of humour, or are too 'prudish'. Often women will be made to feel like they 'asked for it' by the way they dressed, or certain behaviour. Basically, we can't win! When we are bombarded by all these different prejudices, attitudes and outdated views, it's easy to see why most sexual harassment goes unreported.

The aim of the 1991 Sexual Harassment Awareness Campaign, is to balance up the scales a bit with all the positive reasons why complaints should be made, ie. it is the right of every single student at Adelaide University, regardless of gender, race, sexuality, to study in an environment free from sexual barassment.

Dear Benjamin Hodges,

I am writing to reply to your question of exactly what it is I do, as requested in your On Dit letter. The Education Vice President of the SAUA has several different roles. Primarily, the EVP is designed to liaise between students and the University on education issues. This includes work on specific committees, such as the ACUE (Advisory Committee for the University Education), Appointments Committees, Academic (Educational Matters) Sub Committee and so on.

I believe that the EVP also has a primary role to assist specific students on a one to one basis with education problems. I have dealt with many students this year on a wide range of issues regarding lunchtime lectures,

remarking, tuition fees, assessment procedures, teaching quality, etc.

On a state and national level, the EVP also has a job to ensure that the SAUA participates in education campaigns and keeps students abreast of the wider education issues. As a member of the State Education Action Group, and involved in NUS and NUS (SA), I have spent a good deal of time writing reports, speaking to the media, attending meetings, coordinating campaigns on issues such as AUSTUDY, HECS, overcrowding and illegal fees.

The EVP also convenes the Education/ Services Standing Committee which provides a forum for debate and direction on education issues. The Student Representative Standing Committee is also convened by the EVP this year, it met for the first time in four years.

The EVP in this post merger era has a job also to ensure that the University is protecting the interests of students on all campuses, and I have spent considerable time this year helping CASM, Roseworthy and ex-City Campus students in particular.



A few weeks ago, Adelaide band "Pure" played the Uni Bar. Before the evening's proceedings, vocalist, Matthew had a bit of a chat to On Dit about colourful lights and insects.

"That sound's like crickets!"
"Where's the bloody drums?"

These are two of the comments I heard at the Uni Bar a few weeks ago. The object of these comments was newish Adelaide 5-piece Pure. But, back to the crickets (the chirpy insects, not the 'sport'), the sounds of which were emerging from the band's sampler played by a man named Michael. At the other end of the stage, stands a man named Matthew singing, his voice sounding strangely like a mixture between Morrissey and the guy from the Housemartins/Beautiful South (take your pick). In between sit 3 guys with a base, two guitars and a shitload of effects pedals ... and just where are the drums?

"We don't have any," explains singer Matthew and follows in his very methodological fashion, "when we started there was a big dance craze - everything was drums, and also we don't want to be an 'inyerface' band. We want to create an environment that people find themselves in Now, of course, we're looking for a drummer, it will only add to it, though ... more percussive stuff."

'No drummer! What is this?' gasp hundreds of Barnesy fans. Pure are strictly no-Barnsey. They are also no-Metallica, no-Country and Western and no-jangle. Exactly what they then? "We all have different tastes, but they converge around the Reading English sound, kind of like Chapterhouse, Ride, Slowdive and Cocteau Twins as well, but were more influenced by a state of mind."

Pure's music is, to me at least, pure (haw haw) emotion. Several people I spoke to that night said they found it boring. This was not, however, the consensus of the many people sitting cross-legged down the front. I think this is the kind of music many would describe as intense, stirring and incessant. It's encapsulating mood-music, capable of turning the euphoric into a depressive or conversely the depressed into a state of euphoria.

Without drums Pure otherwise consist of sampler Michael, bassist John, guitarists Chris and Mahat, and vocalist Matthew. All assist in the writing of their tunes with Matthew and Mahat doing the larger share of the melody lines and lyrics.

The final result is definitely atmospheric. It's hard to say that without sounding wanky, Pure take their music seriously but without crossing the bridge to pretentiousness.

"We're not trying to put on a professional front now, just to be relaxed and take our time ... because the audience is not uptight anyway."

Live, their performance includes some incredibly colourful lights. Playing at Le Rox a few months ago the dry ice and lighting effects were so thick those of us watching couldn't actually see the band an interesting contrast between them and many bands whose members 'just wanna be famous'.

"The whole kind of feeling we're trying

to evoke is enhanced by the coloured lights and blurry smoke and so forth because it just reminds you of certain states of mind. We're trying to create an environment for the audience to interact with. If it's just these people up on a stage they don't feel a part of it, but with the lights they're experiencing it in a totally different way."

Recorded, however, they manage to reproduce more of the sounds they'd like to: "primarily, I think we're a recording band." Apparently, so do the nice people at Triple M who put Pure's first demo in at No 14 on teh KAOS Top 21 chart back in May. A "little surprised", Matthew explains: "We did that in John's kitchen on a 4-track." This led me to wonder if John ever eats: since then they've recorded another two demos, one of which will probably be gracing the airwaves of Triple M soon.

And what of the future? Pure are well aware that while Adelaide is a great place

to start a band, to progress to any heights whatsoever, they will have to move.

"That's not to say there's anything wrong with the place - we like it! Adelaide is probably the best place in Australia to start music, a lot easier than, say, Sydney where if you're bad you'll just get kicked off ... unless you're really weird. I guess we'll probably have to move interstate."

But do they want world domination? "No, not world domination, world acceptance would be good."

To some, Pure may seem afraid to rock, but that's OK by them, they don't want to rock. Their music is unique, thought-provoking, and they certainly put their effects pedals to good use. Furthermore, Pure are the only band I know of that make the pop/insect crossover - this alone is ample reason to check them out!

Avanti Moda

Avanti Moda is Italian for "in front of fashion", and is a rough translation of the French Depeche Mode which means "fast fashion", that's right kids, we're talking about a Depeche Mode cover band!

and a microphone.

If you have ever heard of DM's music (who hasn't!), you will realise that it is less than simple and the production on it is incredible. Avanti Moda are attempting to recreate this sound without the millions of dollars DM have available for production, and the result is very impressive.

They have avoided the temptation to

sample actual DM material, thus all the sounds they use they have recorded themselves and any factory effects they use they alter themselves to improve the sound (for ignorant people like myself, factory effects are like computer discs which plug into the keyboard and give it a certain effect, ie. a drum beat ... I think that's right, anyway). The band is also looking for a guitarist to add to their

line up to boost their sound.

Their repertoire includes material from all of DM's albums and the overall effect Avanti Moda create is very impressive. I heard their versions of "A question of time", "Strangelove", "Route 66" and "Master and Servant" and was impressed by the fact that all of them remained faithful to the originals, and yet also showed Avanti Moda's personal touches.

Avanti Moda are presently seeking their first gig, and may well be playing at the Wall night club soon (they would provide the first incentive I've ever had to go near the place!).

Their goal is not, however, to join the hordes of cover bands which are infecting the local music scene, but rather to play as Avanti Moda for a few months, to gain experience (and hopefully an audience), before they change their name to Das Concept and start doing originals, so see them as Avanti Moda while you can, and look out for Das Concept in the future.

The CD is nicely closed with an alternative version of "Jennifer" which is a slower acoustic version of the single, then the original version of the same song.




Bellybutton Jellyfish EMI EP

Elektra a Masterplese

Not One For The Blue-rinse Nobs

Regicide and ritual sacrifice, hysterical frenzy, horror and harrowing tyranny, betrayal and bloodlust, insanity, incarcertation and incestuous lesbianism, vengeance and vanquishment, deception, delusion and derangement, murder and madness: the stuff complexes are made of. All these elements of a good wholesome family night out can be seen at the State Opera's superbly successful season of the sumptuous Sophoclean savagery of Strass' Elecktra. It's a must.

The action takes place at the palace of Mycenae.

Elektra has kept but a tenuous grip on sanity after learning that her father Agamemnon was murdered on his retun from the Trojan wars by her mother Klytemnestra and her vile toyboy Aegisth. All that is keeping her going is the knowledge that ther brother Orest will soon return to help her avenge the murder. Elektra tries to gird up her sister Chrysothemis' loins to help her, but all the poor girl wants is a nice warm man to keep her pregnant.

The Queen Klytemnestra convinced Elektra is a witch and reveals that it is the fear of Elektra's powers that has stopped her from being executed. She asks Elektra what an appropriate sacrifice would be to stop the monstrous spiral of murders. Elektra nearly drives Klytemnestra over the edge (of sanity,

not the orchestra pit) by telling her that she must sacrifice herself, when Klytemnestra is saved by a servant bearing good tidings. Exultant, she races off. The news is, inevitably, that Orest is dead.

Now, almost hysterical Elektra, after failing to gain the help of Chryssie, resolves to do the deed herself when, quite neatly, who should arrive but Orest. All the baddies meet a gruesome death. Beside herself with joy, Elektra begins a celebratory dance which turns into an orgiastic frenzy culminating in her fatal collapse.

The role of Elektra is generally acknowledged to be one of the most difficult ever written. The character never leaves the stage in the whole two hours, is almost always singing and has to dance like crazy at the end. Vocally, the part is murderous and unrelenting and it is for this reason that many of the world's great Elektra's - such as Birgit Nilsson and Eva Marton - have

waited until comparatively late in their careers before tackling it.


It is difficult to imagine either of these superstar sopranos even approaching Manlyn Zschau's magnificent portrayal. She is amazing. This is a once a decade performance for Adelaide. The opening night audience acknowledged this with one of the most enthusiastic standing ovations I've ever seen. She blows away the notion that singers are too busy to act by giving a tremendous meld of blistering singing and acting. Her ability to use the voice as a dramatic as well as a musical tool will see her compared to such greats as Callas and Schwartzkopf. It is difficult to concentrate on any of the other characters, such is the power of her mesmensing stage presence. In the recognition of Orest scene, she beautifully brings off the opera's only truly lyrical passage - a notorious trap in the work as Elektra has already had an hour or so of near-screeching to do. My only gripe would be that her dancing is not frenzied enough, but that seems to be directorial fault.

Yvonne Minton is an acknowledged star overseas and it is but one of General Manager Bill Gillespie's many coups that finds her singing here. She stunning Klytemnestra, the deranged murderess whose sinful catalogue of horrors has led her body to decay in tandem with her soul. Hers is a throatily rich mezzo; vocally and

theatrically as good a portrayal as Marily Zschau's. Her silly dress caused her to trip as she exited, which somewhat detracted from her aristocratic demeanour.

The production has been dol by using Director Bruce Beresford's name. The scourge of Hollywood seems to have mostly concentrated on getting out of the performers' way rather than giving much specific direction. This is fine if you're a Marilyn or an Yvonne, but let-off-the-leash lesser principals were inclined to put one foot on the prompt box and sing to the gallery, Payarottiesque.

John Stoddart's tottering, shocking set was a disturbing representation of the decay of Greek society. The real grubbiness, decadence and emotional turmoil, however, comes from the great Strauss' music. The score is rich, vibrant, dense and ugly and an absolute masterpiece of operatic/theatric characterisation. Everyone of the myriad




emotions and complexities of the characters is perfectly presented by this, one of the most incredible and exhilaratingly chilling pieces of music ever written. The ASO has not played this well for a long time and Maestro Richard Armstrong's stick-waving showed a remarkable and thorough understanding of both the music and theatrics of the score.

Well done (God, I sound like Harold Tideman) to everyone, except the wanker (now I don't) who stuffed up the surtitles and the fool who made the backstage clatter (audible only in the cheap seats, I'm told). Molto bravissimo to Bill Gillespie who has assembled a cash and crew the likes of which I've never seen and regrettably don't

expect to for a long time.

Now, for God's sake, go go go go go and see this show. Don't expect any Nessun Dormas, but enjoy the spinechilling blend of drama and music. It's on on the 20th August at 7 pm (not 8 pm) and student rush an hour before is only \$12 (less than 1/3 the normal price). You'll get good seats as most of Adelaide's opera goers won't go unless there is Spanish nobleman in tights - bunch of blue rinse nobs.

Forbidden Broadway Hotel Adelaide

There's a line in "Anne of Green Gables" that makes me chuckle whenever I am reminded of it: Anne proudly exclaiming, "We're going to put on the best darn school play *ever*!". that showbiz ethic, that "Let's put on a show!!" - type feeling makes me want to lose my cookies. It also makes me want to laugh.

Forbidden Broadway is cabaret - a show taking the piss out of broadway musicals through songs taken from the shows they satirise, with alternate lyrics. I was going to write "naughty" lyrics, but it would have been completely untrue. The only rude bit in the whole thing was when one of the performers tapped his genitals live on stage!! Titter, titter, hee, hee, hee, can't stop laughing, oh help, stop it, please.

The introductory number, sung to the tune of a major Broadway hit with which I was not familiar, included the unashamed declaration:

"We're a trifle rude

And we might even get sued!"

It was disappointing that the show did not live up to this brash promise. Forbidden Broadway perpetuated the myths of the broadway sacred cows that it should have slaughtered.

The skits on "Annie" and Liza Minelli, both featuring Donna Lee, were satisfying exceptions. Annie was played as a thirty year old woman, still in teeny-weeny red dress and Janet Frame hair, screaming out, "I need a sequel! Write me the sequel!" The satire on Liza Minelli was the funniest moment in the show. Being a Liza Minelli fan - she belongs in the Kylie Minogue class of talentless Megastars (I love that irony) - I was appalled and amused at the accuracy

of the send up.

Other musicals featured in Forbidden Broadway included Cats, The King and I, My Fair Lady and Les Miserables (Les MiseraBLAH) - a skit that went on for far too long. Even Madonna got a serve ... a pity it wasn't nastier.

All the pieces in Forbidden Broadway were accompanied by David King on the piano. Performing for two almost hour-length sets without a single bum note is impressive. If he did stuff up any notes I didn't catch it. The performers were all strong and clear, with Donna Lee being the strongest and the clearest.


The sound system was poor at first, with the microphones crackling away like that bubble gum which pops in your mouth. Most distracting.

In Cameras Coming Soons



Jean-Paul Sartre, french novelist, dramatist and philospher, was the major exponent of the theory of existentialism, i.e. "a man must create values for himself by action and by living each moment to the full ... it denies objective universal values". He wrote In Camera (Huis Clos) in 1944. In Camera is about 3 people who, having died, find themselves together in a room from which they cannot escape. They initially cannot understand how this could be any kind of "hell" or afterlife, but it beomes apparent that their conflicting personalities create their own hell.

There are three main characters, Inez, Garcin and Estelle, plus the "Valet" who introduces them to their new "life".

The actors are all in their early twenties, and are all studying acting at present.

Jodi Martin, who plays the role of Inez, when asked awhat inspired her to produce and direct *In Camera*, says "I was frustrated by the lull in work available at present, largely due to the recession and economic climate, and decided to take the challenge of producing, directing and performing a play. *In Camera* appealed to me as it is a fairly short and intense play, which deals with issues that are especially of interest to younger people. I feel that presenting a production like this to a young audience helps to make theatre become more accessible and realistic to them."

Fun With Auntie

Readers who watch ABC television will have noticed by now a series being continually plugged with heavy music, moving camera frames and various religious memorabilia. This is *Brides of Christ*.

Speaking exclusively to On Dit, Mr Will Lowes, the Adelaide ABC publicist, said that he is confident Brides will win many awards for TV drama excellence. Lowes confirmed, "Brides will be bigger than Ben Hur!".

So, what's it all about? The six one-hour episodes trace the lives of several young women who enter a convent. The series is set in the 1960s. It is a different series, though, because the convent is in Australian and "Brides" attempts to depict change in modern society - juxtaposed to the Catholic Church - from an Australian perspective.

For many years, Australian productions have been mere clichés of a minority of Australians' lives, for example, the shearer or cattle/horse handler genre. Brides breaks this mould in that it looks at true conflict between the old and the new in our

country, in the form of the Church's vows and discipline on the one hand and freedom and sex on the other.

The publication of the allegedly fraudulent documents took place over a 25 year period.



Row Row Row Your Boah

Boat Club exceeds state limit 110th Anniversary

The Adelaide University Boat Club sits on the northern bank of the River Torrens, commanding a view downstream towards the city bridge and the colourful Solley's Boat House. The current boat house was erected in 1908, a donation from the Barr Smith family. The club has always fostered a belief in participation and success, which is reflected in its history.

Outside the lecture room, sport was the first influence to bring students together. In 1881, the year of occupation of the solitary University building, now the Mitchell Building, the first sporting club was formed, the 'Boats' or Rowing Club (initially opened to graduates only).

The first Intervarsity was held in 1888. The following is an extract from *The Lower Level* by Margaret M. Finnis, "A Discursive History of the Adelaide University Union", Griffin Press, 1975.

'The first boat race between the Australian Universities was held on the Yarra in 1888, when the three Universities compteted, and it ended in a victory for Melbourne, with Adelaide two lengths behind, and Sydney a similar distance behind Adelaide.

The 1889 Inter-University Boat-Race took place in Adelaide on Saturday 21 December, and the following account of it appeared in the December issue of *The MSS Review*:

"On Saturday, December 21, the great rowing event of the year as far as the University is concerned, took place, the contest being held at Port Adelaide between crews from the Universities of Melbourne and Adelaide. The race this year was to have been on the Parramatta, and a crew from the Sydney University was to have taken part in the contest also, but owing to examinations and other ills that students' flesh is heir to, they found they would be unable to raise a crew for the date fixed. The Inter-Varsity boat race of 1889 was rowed between Adelaide and Melbourne, and the venue altered from the Paramatta River to the waters of Port Adelaide.

"The race of 1889 was over a course of about 2 1/2 miles and was followed by three steamers.

First there was the umpires' boat, which

had on board His Excellency the Governor, the Chancellor, the Vice-Chancellor and several members of the Council, and some other University dignitaries with the umpire and some ladies. The students took possession of another boat and the general public followed in a third. When the crews appeared they were heartily cheered by the vivacious undergrads, who made matters lively in their boat by songs and sundry witticisms at the expense of anything they could find at which they could launch their shafts of brilliant wit.

"A little before 5 pm, both crews appeared and slowly paddled to the starting point, and at about 5 minutes past 5 the word to go was given and the race started. For the first two to three hundred yards it was a neck and neck race, and the Adelaides, who were the favourites and a somewhat heavier crew than their opponents, forged ahead and gradually increased the lead, and by the time they had gone a mile were a length and a half to the good; after this it became a procession, the Melbournes losing ground all the rest of the way, being about four to five lengths behind the judge's boat.... The Melbournes were at rather a disadvantage, their boat being less sea-worthy and they had to row against wind and (tide) in which the Adelaide's superior weight gave them the advantage. But putting this aside, the better crew won, and we hope to see the black and white colours to the fore in the Inter-University race of 1890 which will be rowed at Sydney at the end of the year.

In the evening the Melbourne crew were entertained by the University Boat Club at a dinner at Beach's Rooms, at which about seventy sat down to 'a sumptuous repast'. Songs and 'other amusements were indulged in until a late hour'."

The Sports Union, now called the Sports Association, was later formed in 1897 as the amalgamation of three clubs, the Boat Club, the Tennis Club and the Lacrosse Club.

Today, the Boat Club is extremely successful at all levels. It has won more premierships than all the other rowing clubs combined, and has consistently won the majority of the State Championships. The Club has also contributed significantly, both now and




Members of the 1920 Women's Fours limber up before the big race


