by them. They had spent £50,000 in buildings, and that amount was as much invested as if they had lent the money, because they could have borrowed the money to complete the building and invested their own money. Teachers were being educated free in the arts and science schools, and the University had paid £4,000 in taxation. They did not want the Government to pay them all these arrears, but he suggested the following plan to deal with the matter:—The University now received close on £7,000 yearly from the Government. He suggested that the Government should make it £10,000 a year, and buy the University land at the amount it was now assessed by the Government officials. He pointed out that the University, in spite of the £800 a year being taken away, had continued the medi-

cal curriculum for five years. They had established a conservatorium of music without aid from the Government, and had extended the course of arts and science. They had supplied a complete commercial course, and established commercial centres in different parts of the State, and reduced the fees so low that often a lecture cost only 6d. or 8d. But for the munificence of a gentleman who would not allow his name to be mentioned they would not have been able to buy any new books for years, and as education was progressing they must have literature. The wants of the University were a chair of education, a lecturer on biology, a lecturer on ancient history, a lecturer on public health, a lecturer on dentistry, the equipment of a geological and mineralogical laboratory, a caretaker's lodge, recreation grounds, and last, but not least, provision for the University.

Mr. Jacobs (chairman of the finance committee), Dr. Barlow, and Mr. Brookman supported the requests. The Hon. T. Price, in reply, said the question was quite new to him. He did not know of the offer to sell the land. He promised them that he would look into the matter and see what could be done. He assured the deputation that their representations would receive careful consideration by the Cabinet.

#### HANSARD REPORT.

The Speaker (Sir Jenkin Coles) took the Chair at 2 p.m.

#### ADELAIDE UNIVERSITY.

Mr. SELLAR read the following memorandum he had received in reference to the Adelaide University:—1. The University of Adelaide is a close corporation, all fees, funds, property, curriculum, examinations, appointments, &c., being in the hands of the council, which is elected solely by graduates of three years' standing, no other interests whatsoever being represented. 2. The present constitution is modelled on a university system that has now been practically abolished in the United Kingdom. 3. Representation of various interests has now been made compulsory by Act of Parliament in the United Kingdom. 4. The Parliament of Victoria found it necessary to legislate last year to provide Government representation on the governing body of the Melbourne University, when a Government subsidy was voted to it. 5. The University of Adelaide has power to confer degrees in medicine and surgery, entitling the holders to be registered as practitioners, while the State has no power to regulate their qualifications, and while there is no inspector as in the United Kingdom to report on the mode of carrying out the examinations. 6. The University, at its own request, was entrusted by the Government with the training of State school teachers. 7. While special legislation in 1884 gave power to the Adelaide University to elect two representatives to the Public Library, Museum, and Art Gallery Board, and in the same year gave power to the University to elect a representative to the Adelaide Hospital Board, no representative of any interests whatever, except those of the graduates of the University itself, are represented in the University governing body." Would the Honourable the Premier, when enquiring into the subject of the taxation of University property at the request of the recent deputation, also enquire into this anomalous position of affairs?

The COMMISSIONER of PUBLIC WORKS (Hon. T. Price) said he would look into the matter.
