Not content with their preliminary outburst, they took a large share of the formal programme. They varied the monotony of the repetition of the phrase, "By virtue of the authority committed to me," with topical songs, which were supposed to refleet the character of the recipients of the degrees. These songs were of no great poetical merit-indeed, they exacted a great deal of poetical license-but they were rendered with a joviality that showed everyone that no malice was intended. The Chief Justice, in his capacity of Chancellor, bore the interruptions in a patient spirit, even when the students rewarded his forbearance by singing-"We'll hang old Sammy to a sour apple tree."
