RETURN OF MR. FREDERIC CHAPPLE.

Mr. Frederic Chapple, B.A., B.Sc., head master of Prince Alfred College, who, with his wife, has been on a six months' trip to Great Britain, returned to Adelaide by the mail steamer India on Saturday. They had a cordial welcome from a large number of friends, among whom were the Rev. T. Piper, president of the college; and Mr. G. S. Cotton, hon. secretary of the institution. The principal object of the trip, Mr. Chapple explained to a representative of "The Register," was to see his friends, but time was found to visit a number of schools and colleges in the old land, and to gather information which will be useful to Prince Alfred College and the state. Mr. and Mrs. Chapple had a very enjoyable trip. They travelled extensively through the country, visiting all the noted beauty spots, and Mr. Chapple was impressed by the general advance and prosperity as compared with that of a quarter of a century ago. Among the places visited were Cambridge, Lincoln, Leeds, the lake districts of Scotland, Edinburgh, the Trossachs, Glasgow, Wolverhampton, Birmingham, Oxford, Eton, Harrow, Folkestone, Brighton, Redhill, and London. Mr. Chapple spent an interesting time at Eton, where he met Dr. Warne, the head master of the college. At Harrow, through the kindness of Sir T. Fowell Buxton, he was introduced to Dr. Wood, the present head master, and Dr. Weldon, the past head master. He paid three visits to Leeds, the great Wesleyan school. At Edinburgh he was twice at Fetter's College, and at Leeds opportunity was afforded him of inspecting the state schools. Mr. Chapple obtained valuable information at Leeds respecting the methods of teaching in operation and the results obtained from Dr. Forsyth, principal of the Higher Grade Board School, and the principal and professors of the Yorkshire College of Science. Mr. Chapple was much impressed with Eton College, its arrangements in all respects being marvellous. He remarked—"I am, however, satisfied that Prince Alfred College is fairly abreast of the schools and colleges of the old country when its size is taken into consideration, and certainly its endowments compares very favourably with anything I saw. A great feature in English schools is the development of self-government among the boys. Although this aspect is more marked in regard to sports, it has entered largely into the management of the societies in connection with the schools, and in my opinion might be followed with great advantage here."

"Technical education is making progress in England, but I did not see any school in which the equipment is superior to ours. I visited technical schools and the best of the higher board schools. The great controversy in England has been over the disposition of the board schools covering secondary ground, but this has not had a set back by the Cockerton judgment."

Mr. Chapple attended the ecumenical council of the Wesleyan Methodist body as a delegate from South Australia, and took part in the educational discussion, in which he pointed out what Australia had learned during the past quarter of a century.
