INSTITUTE OF TROPICAL MEDICINE.  
WELCOME TO THE DIRECTOR.  
At the Queen's Hotel, Townsville, on Wednesday evening, January 5, a dinner was given by Bishop Frodsham in honour of Dr. Breinl, the newly arrived and first Director of the Institute of Tropical Medicine of North Queensland.  
Bishop Frodsham, in proposing the health of the guest of the evening, said he esteemed it an honour that they should join him in welcoming Dr. Breinl—he had almost said in inaugurating the Institute of Tropical Medicine. For although there were no piles of noble buildings in Townsville, such as the American Government had erected at Manila for the investigation of parasitology, in the Philippines, yet they were commencing work with an instrument without which the noblest building would be an empty shell—that was, with a man. (Applause.) Dr. Breinl came with a high reputation. Mjr. Ronald Ross told him (the speaker) in a conversation last year that Dr. Breinl was the best man available in England at the time. Dr. Breinl had been chosen by three men whose names stood out in the scientific world as authorities in the investigation of tropical diseases—Sir Patrick Manson, Mjr. Ronald Ross, and Dr. Bradshaw. In their choice, these men asked for the leading scientific societies of the Empire—the Royal Society of England, and the London and Liverpool Schools of Tropical Medicine. They had a reasonable assurance, therefore, that Dr. Breinl was the man who would inaugurate a new era in the study of the tropical medicine of Australia. Personally he (the speaker) looked forward to the time when they would have fine buildings—a second Lister Institute—in Townsville. He looked forward to the time when the best medical students of their Australian universities would come to Townsville for courses of study in tropical medicines. He looked forward to an increase of scientific knowledge in the existing Australian medical schools through the investigation done and the specimens collected in the laboratories in Townsville. And, above all, he looked forward to the alleviation of human suffering, and the better colonization of tropical Australia. To paraphrase the words of a great Frenchman—if they would colonize their Australian tropics they must make the conditions of life as healthy as possible. Dr. Breinl would find medical men in the north who had already great knowledge of tropical diseases. They had learned by experience so much that they desired to know more. The field of investigation was so large that he (Dr. Breinl) could not afford to disregard their help. With their help—and that would be gladly given—he would do much for science. Indeed the motto of the institute should be co-operation, and its aim the advancement of medical knowledge. The spirit of the institute must be that of Liverpool, where comradeship and zeal for work was united in a remarkable degree. He hoped he might be forgiven for speaking thus. In a humble way he had worked for four years for that day. At first he was almost alone, except for Dr. Ross and Mr. G. H. Pritchard, who first saw with him a vision of the future. But as time went on the friends increased. If he could, without being invidious, single out two men without whose aid the institute would never have come into being, he would name Lord Chelmsford and Sir Charles Lucas. And he must also add the name of their one great benefactor, Mr. D'Arcy, of Rockhampton.

Dr. Breinl, in responding, said he had promises of support from the Australian universities, the State and Federal Governments, and of everybody concerned in Townsville, and especially the Townsville Hospital. Ten years ago they knew practically nothing about tropical medicine.
