The Chancellor (to Dr. Brown)—You are a native of South Australia, and we are proud of the academical distinctions which you have won on the other side of the world.

The Chancellor (to Mr. Ray)—I congratulate you on the manner in which you have won your degree. I do not think that in the history of the medical school any student has had a more distinguished, if an equally distinguished, career. During your five years' curriculum you passed in the first class every year save one, when no student attained that honour. You obtained an Elder prize in your first year, and the Davies Thomas scholarship in your third and fourth years—which meant that you were the best man of those years—and you won the Everard scholarship in your final year. I congratulate you very heartily.

To Mr. Lewis—In the annals of this University 1906 will be distinguished as a year of first classes in the medical course. Since I have held the position of Chancellor I do not remember seeing so many men take first-class in this course, and I congratulate you upon being second best in the first class this year.

To Mr. Pellow—I congratulate you upon running Mr. Ray very hard, for I find you have taken first class in each of the five years of your studentship except in the second year, when, I understand, you took second class. I congratulate you upon the advance of your studentship.

To Mr. Griffiths—I congratulate you also upon having won your first class.

Dr. Lendon presented the winners of the Elder prizes—William Malcolm Sinclair (student of the first year), Mary Johanna Alberta Theodora Delprat (student of the second year).

The Chancellor (to Mr. Sinclair)—I congratulate you upon being the best man of your first year in the medical school.

Miss Delprat was not present. The Dr. Davies Thomas scholars—Henry Kenneth Fry, B.Sc. (student of the third year), Lionel Oxborough Betts (student of the fourth year).

The Chancellor (to Mr. Fry)—This is the third time I have the pleasure of congratulating you. You were the first student of your year, and won the Elder prize in your first year, obtained the same distinction in your second, and now you obtain a similar distinction in your third year as the winner of the Dr. Davies Thomas prize. I wish you still further success.

To Mr. Betts—I congratulate you most heartily upon being the best man of the fourth year, and upon having won the Dr. Davies Thomas scholarship.

The Chancellor—We shall see Mr. Naylor next year as the new Professor of Classics. Professor Dettmann was acting Professor of Classics during the year just closed, and we parted from him with very great regret indeed.

The Chancellor (to Miss Cowperthwaite)—I remember admitting you to the B.A. degree with honour in classics in 1903. I congratulate you most heartily upon having taken your M.A. degree in the first class.

THE UNIVERSITY.

COMMEMORATION DAY.

The annual commemoration, in connection with the University of Adelaide was held in the Elder Hall on Monday, under the presidency of the Chancellor (Sir Samuel Way), and in the presence of the Governor (Sir George Le Hunte), who is the official visitor to the University. The members of the Senate and Council assembled in the concert-room in the basement of the Conservatorium 20 minutes before the time fixed for the ceremony to begin; each wore the academic costume proper to his respective degrees and offices. The Senate and Council proceeded to the Elder Hall in the following order:—The Senate—The clerk of the Senate, bachelors of music, science, arts, medicine, and laws, masters of arts, doctors of music, science, medicine, and laws, the warden of the Senate. Then followed the teachers of the Elder Conservatorium, the acting director, the lecturers, and professors of the University, the registrar, the council, the vice-chancellor, and the chancellor. The chancellor, the vice-chancellor, the warden of the Senate, members of the council, Senate, staff members of boards, and faculties, candidates for degrees, diplomas, and advanced commercial certificates and medals, and the registrar occupied seats on the platform. The Governor was, on arrival, received by the vice-chancellor, and conducted to the platform and welcomed by the Chancellor.
