In the House of Assembly on Thursday the Speaker read a cable message he had received stating that Lieutenant W. J. THE UNIVERSITIES AND RESEARCH.

Professor Mitchell (vice-chairman of the University of Adelaide) writes:—"I should like to supplement what I said to your representative when he showed me a summary of the Melbourne report regarding the universities and research. He records me correctly, but some readers have misunderstood:—1. The report is by and for Melbourne alone. Presumably, therefore, it does not say what other universities ought or ought not to do, but what Victoria ought to do, and where she may look for help instead of trying to do everything. Also, though it is a question of economy, it is of economy in fresh expenditure. 2. It concerns research and special training in directions where students can be few and must be supported. For that reason it is natural for a Government to grudge the cost, and that is why I spoke of private benefactions. May I add that this is the field where a university can best be a monument and where a small university may rank in quality with the largest. But a Government can do many things to clear the field; and the best thing about the report is that it was requested by the Victorian Minister of Education, no doubt with a view to the better equipment of the University of Melbourne. 3. I printed recently a table of figures to show the amazing rate at which the incomes of the 30 state universities in the United States had advanced between 1896 and 1914. The figures say that in these 18 years their incomes had been multiplied by nine. Professor Trueblood, of the University of Michigan, who was in Adelaide ten days ago, had seen the figures, and he wished me to add that they are not quite fair to his state Legislature, because in some states the agricultural college is part of the university, and in Michigan it is not, being too far away. I told him that I should take occasion to mention this; and the present is a good occasion, when it is suggested that expenditure in one university may relieve others of a burden. For in America the result has been the opposite. There the growth of university work in one state has only added to the growth of work in the rest. I have no doubt the same will happen in Australia. 4. But it will be a long time before we reach the level of the University of Michigan, which has rather more than twice the incomes of the six Australian universities put together. And Michigan is only fifth on the list of those state universities. It has £500,000 a year; Wisconsin has £750,000; Minnesota the same; and Professor Trueblood says that this fortunate place will soon have a million. And of the universities that are not public property, being privately endowed, America has 12 whose endowments range from a million to seven million pounds, and there are fifty or so with an endowment of over a million dollars. 5. It was with these facts in view that I expressed approval of the Melbourne report on the two grounds of efficiency and economy. There are two alternatives before all our Governments. One is to put the talent of the State in a napkin, and try for efficiency through economy; the other is to seek economy through efficiency. It needs some faith, but the Americans, too, are a business people."
