INTER-VARSITY FOOTBALL.

ADELAIDE BEAT MELBOURNE.

After a hard-fought match on the University Oval on Wednesday afternoon, Adelaide University, 9 goals 14 behinds, beat Melbourne University, 8 goals 12 behinds. The local team thus turned the tables, for Victoria scored from them, in inclement weather, in Melbourne last year. The victory may be attributed to the greater dash and slightly better cohesion exhibited by the home men. However, as was the case with the visitors, the forward division was weak. The back men on both sides, by forceful tactics, predominated to a large extent. The ground, after the recent heavy falls of rain, was in a bad condition, which accounted for the somewhat uninspiring display. The teams were as follows: Adelaide—Boucaut, Caine, Cocks, Finney, Fischer, Fox, Gunning, Haskard, Hon., Johncock, Koerner, Prest, Scobie, Sumner, Symonds, Ziegler, and Ashton. South Australia opened the play with great dash, and registered 7 points before their opponents broke through. The Melbourne men were unable to develop a system until some time later in the quarter, but their back men were responsible for the frustration of many South Australian onslaughts. However, when they found their feet, the visitors quickly rattled on a couple of goals, and but for their erratic shooting would have had a fairly substantial lead. The quarter ended:—Melbourne, 25; Adelaide, 22. Upon the resumption of play the standard of football considerably increased, South Australia in particular showing fine combined effort. Their sharpshooters, although their kicking was still wide, were quicker to the ball, and made more of their opportunities than their opponents, who were playing good individual football, but were lacking in team work. It was the Adelaide men's quarter, for they added 31 points to the visitors' 11. The scoring board showed:—South Australia, 63; Melbourne, 31. After the long interval the game deteriorated, both sides adopting rough-and-tumble methods, with the result that scoring became difficult and the play congested and unscientific. The ball travelled in most instances along the boundary from goal to goal, and the scrimmages which ensued were responsible for injuries to several players. When the bell rang at "lemons" Adelaide had scored 7.10, and Melbourne 4.12. The final quarter was marked by a brilliant recovery by the Victorian players, who almost snatched a last-minute victory. They were fresher and more vigorous than their opponents, and repeatedly attacked. However, the ringing of the bell dispelled their hopes, and South Australia emerged winners, with the scores:—Adelaide, 9.14; Victoria, 8.12. Best players:—Adelaide—Hone, Prest, Symonds, Caine, Davie, Sumner, Finney, Cocks, and Fox; Melbourne—Lockwood, Mitchell, Kerr, Orchard, Ganim, Richardson, Tranter, and McLean. Goalkeepers:—Adelaide—Prest, Sumner, and Scobie (each 2); Koerner, Hone, and Cox; Melbourne—Smith, Taylor, and Mitchell (each 2), Orchard, and Tate.

ASTRONOMERS IN PERTH.

Perth, August 16.

The party of astronomers who are going to Wallal, between Broome and Port Hedland, on the north-west coast, to observe the eclipse of the sun on September 21 arrived to-day by the transcontinental train. They include Dr. W. W. Campbell (director of Lick Observatory, California), Dr. J. H. Moore (astronomer of the Lick Observatory), Dr. C. E. Adams (Government Astronomer of New Zealand), Mr. J. B. O. Hosking (of the Melbourne Observatory), Dr. C. A. Chant (of the Toronto University), Dr. R. K. Young (of Victoria, British Columbia), and Lieutenant-Commander Quick, who will be in command of the party.

The scientists were given a civic welcome at the Town Hall, at which the Government were represented.

Dr. Campbell, in responding to the toast of the visitors, said they would use a delicate instrument, which they would try to have ready and pointed precisely at the desired point during the critical five minutes nineteen seconds they would have for making observations. He referred to the valuable assistance given by Professor Ross, of the Perth University, and Mr. Hunt, the Federal Meteorologist.

Interstate Law Debate.

Advt. DEBATES BY UNIVERSITY STUDENTS. 18/8/22

The annual inter-University debating tournament, which is to begin in Melbourne on Monday, has this year created considerable interest in the eastern States. The Universities of Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Hobart, and Adelaide were to have been represented, but owing to the examinations clashing with the debates as arranged, Brisbane and Hobart will unfortunately be unable to send teams. Although this is the first occasion on which Adelaide has figured in these contests, they have been held annually for some years. The syllabus of debates will be:—August 21, Adelaide versus Sydney, in which Adelaide will affirm, "That the recent reductions made by the Commonwealth Government in the provision for Australian national defence are justified;" August 23, Adelaide versus Melbourne, when Adelaide will affirm "That Australian industries should be nationalised;" August 25, Melbourne versus Sydney, when Sydney will affirm, "That the making of awards by arbitration is the best practicable means of regulating industrial conditions and wages." The team to represent this State will be:—Messrs. S. C. G. Wright, J. J. Davoren, and F. Penoyre Adams. In the first debate, Mr. Davoren will lead for Adelaide, and in the second Mr. Wright will be the captain. The team will leave by the Melbourne express to-day, and will stay at the residential colleges attached to the University of Melbourne.

Late Kenneth O. Stephens.

Much sympathy will be felt with Mr. O. H. Stephens, the Commonwealth electoral officer, in the loss of his only surviving son, Mr. Kenneth Owen Stephens, who, after a brilliant scholastic career, was a fourth year medical student at the University of Adelaide. He was taken ill about a fortnight ago, and died in a private hospital on Thursday. A second son of Mr. Stephens died some years ago at the age of 11. Mr. Kenneth Stephens, who was in his 21st year, was born at Gilberton, and for some years attended the Pulteney Grammar School, after which he went to St. Peter's College, and passed the junior, senior, and higher public examinations, also winning the Bowman scholarship for science. He was a devoted and an able student, and was doing so well in his University course as to give every promise of a successful career. He was popular with his associates, and in addition to being a member of the University Rowing Club, was a devotee of swimming and walking. During one vacation he and others walked from Adelaide to Cape Jervis and back.

Late Mr. A. Y. Harvey

The death occurred on Tuesday after about a week's illness, of Mr. Arthur Young Harvey, of Medindie, who was one of the oldest of Adelaide's public accountants. The deceased, who was born in Scotland 79 years ago, was for about five years in business in South Africa before he came to South Australia about the year 1872. Mr. Harvey was auditor for many South Australian companies, but at no time took a conspicuous part in public affairs. He has left a widow (daughter of the late Sir James Penn Boucaut, a former Judge of the Supreme Court), three sons—Messrs. Kenneth (South Africa), Eric (Adelaide), and Howard Harvey (a director of G. S. Yuille & Co., Limited, Sydney)—and three daughters—Messdames Evans, McKenzie, and Borrow.

Mr. Arthur Young Harvey, who was one of Adelaide's oldest accountants, died on Tuesday, after a short illness, in his eightieth year. He was born in Scotland, and as a young man established himself in business in South Africa. He remained here for about five years, coming to South Australia in 1872. Mr. Harvey had a large connection as auditor for a number of companies in Adelaide, but, being of a retiring disposition, took no part in public affairs. He leaves a widow, who is sister of the late Sir James Penn Boucaut, three sons—Messrs. Kenneth Harvey (South Africa), Eric Harvey (Adelaide), and Howard Harvey (a director of Messrs. S. Yuille & Co., of Sydney)—and three daughters—Messdames Evans, McKenzie, and Borrow. Mr. Harvey was a cousin of the Dean of Adelaide (Very Rev. G. L. Young).

Dr. R. W. Cilento, who recently received an important appointment under the Commonwealth Health Department, left Adelaide by the Melbourne express en route for Queensland on Saturday. Dr. Cilento, who is a son of Mr. R. A. Cilento (traffic inspector of the Southern lines of the South Australian Railways) will conduct research work regarding the effect of tropical conditions on white people. He will make the Commonwealth Institute of Tropical Research his headquarters.

Mr. A. L. G. Mackay, B.A., Dip. Ed., D.C.M., of Sydney, has been appointed Assistant Lecturer in Economics at the University of Adelaide, and will take up his duties early in 1923. Mr. Mackay had a brilliant career at the University of Sydney, both in his academic work and in the social and athletic life of the University. In 1916 he took his B.A., and in 1919 obtained the Diploma in Education. Since that time he has been a student in the Department of Economics, and he hopes to obtain the Bachelor of Economics degree before coming to Adelaide. His work in economics won him the Irvine prize in that subject, and Professor Irvine describes him as one of the best students who ever passed through the Economics Faculty of the University of Sydney. Throughout his University course he played a prominent part in the University Union, various forms of sports and athletics, and the debating society. From 1916-1919 he was on military service abroad, where he rose from the rank of private to that of first-class warrant officer. He was awarded the D.C.M. at Peronne. Mr. Mackay is at present a master at the Fort Street High School, Sydney. In the University of Adelaide his time will be divided between lecturing to economics and commercial students and taking charge of tutorial classes, under the Director of Tutorial Classes.

Dr. H. Heaton, director of tutorial classes at the Adelaide University, will leave Adelaide by the east-west express on Sunday morning, for a lecturing tour of Western Australia, under the auspices of the Perth Anglican Social Questions Committee. This committee has for the past three years arranged for visitors from the eastern States to lecture on current international and social problems.

NATIONAL DEFENCE.

DEBATED BY UNIVERSITY STUDENTS.

Melbourne, August 21. Teams representing the Universities of Sydney and Adelaide met at the Melbourne University clubhouse to-night to debate the proposition "That the recent action of the Commonwealth Government in reducing the provision for national defence is justified." The Adelaide team—Messrs. J. J. Davoren, H. C. Senior, and F. P. Adams—spoke in justification of the present Commonwealth attitude, and the Sydney team—Messrs. R. W. G. Mackay, R. S. Lee, and F. R. Lovat—took the opposite view. The adjudicators (Sir J. W. Barrett, Mr. J. G. Latham, and Mr. F. W. Eggleston) decided in favor of Sydney by a small margin.
