NEW GRADUATES WELCOME!

LUNCHEON AT BOTANIC PARK.

Each year, on the eve of the commem ration ceremony, members of the Gr duates' Association tender a luncheon congratulation to those students of t University, who have emerged from t undergraduate stage, and are about to r ceive their degrees. The seventh fun tion of this pleasing character was held the leafy coolness of the Botanic Pa on Wednesday. More than 180 guest including about 110 new graduates, s down at tables arranged beneath the tre at the rear of the Botanic Gardens. T President of the association (Mr. E. V Holden) presided, and was supported l the Lord Mayor (Mr. Wallace Bruce Others seated at the head table were: Dr. W. Ray, Professor E. H. Davies, M A. Grenfell Price, Dr. C. S. Hicks, D k. Palleine, the Hon. P. McM. Glyn Professor Brailsford Robertson, Mr. C. Maddigan, and Mr. S. Talbot Smith. In welcoming the visitors, the Chairma said that the long desired site for th Union Building had been made availabl It was facing Victoria drive, on th eastern side of the vacant block of lan there, and tenders were already bein called for the Lady Symon block, and th were deeply indebted to Sir Josiah Symc for his magnificent gift of £10,000. Th were going right ahead with the work constructing the block, which would r for the women. Designs had been co mpleted for the whole of the block, a tenders would probably be called for t refectory and the cloisters. This was t jubilee year of the University, and ear next year they would have the respon sibility of inaugurating schemes for raisi money for the erection of the block. Th had about £7,000 in hand, for which th were greatly indebted to Professor He derson, whose work would enable them call for tenders for about £10,000 £11,000 worth of work. It was gratifyi to know that Professor Henderson wa completely restored to health and strengt and was engaged upon research work th Pacific, which would probably occup 10 years. (Applause.)

Obligations of Graduates.

The Lord Mayor remarked that th were among the gathering, graduates fr all faculties, represented by arts, lav science, engineering, medicine, dentistr commerce, and music. Those profession covered a very wide field of learning an activities, and the influence of those pr sent would be great, and should be use to increase the usefulness of the Un versity. Graduates, however, should n be unmindful of their obligations to th Adelaide seat of learning, and shou always bear in mind the advantage and a sistance they had received from the Un versity of Adelaide. They should bear i mind that the granting of a degree an diploma was the obtaining of the franchi which would grant them the privileg having a voice in the election of some o those who, in the future, would control t destinies of the University. For th reason they should treat the University a public institution, and be ever mindf of its welfare, and exercise their vot such a manner as to permit it to car on the splendid work it h achieved during the past 50 year The world was hungry for the man an woman of brains, and there was a call b professions, the commercial and industri community, for alert well-trained men an women to play a responsible part in a walks of life.

In conclusion, the Lord Mayor said would like to compliment them, as Pr sident of the Chamber of Commerce, th establishment of a Graduates' Emplo ment Bureau, of which their President co so closely associated. In America th seemed that such agencies had done mu to make the industrial and commerc

community feel the advantage of Unive sity trained men. Unfortunately, in Au tralia very little had been done in th direction, and the establishment of a bureau should prove a very useful fiel work, both to the University graduate, at the industrial and commercial communit (Applause.)

The Real University Life.

In responding on behalf of the wom graduates, Miss Ida Dorsch (first cla honours in classics) made a happy spee in which she said they felt they we no longer carefree undergraduates, b were expected to become respectable me mbers of the community (laughter), shou dering the responsibilities and tradition their University. The real Universa life was, perhaps, the greatest facto determining what they, as individual were going to do in the community.

Mr. R. G. Mitton (first class honours physics, and 1926 Rhodes Scholar) r sponded for the men graduates. Ther could be no doubt, he said, that muc benefit which students derived from t University came from the association clubs, and societies connected with t institution. In Adelaide, they were for nate in having a live Graduates' Associ tion, in which they could keep in touc with each other after having complet their degrees.

Dr. C. S. Hicks (Professor of Huma Physiology and Pharmacology) spok those who were to receive ad endu degrees. If a University was going function truly, he said, it was not goi to do so from the professors and lectur down, but from the graduate body up. that body was taking an interest in t future of the University, it would devel into an institution of great power in t community.

A PROCESSION OF STUDENTS.

AMUSING TOPICAL FEATURES.

The annual procession of the students of the University of Adelaide, under the auspices of the Sports Association, took place on Thursday, and created the customary interest, amusement and excitement. Free from their studies for a time, the young men entered whole heartedly into the fun. They also drew heavily on their imagination, besides being decidedly original in their topical representations. Quite a number of public men were satirised or caricatured, but the admitted levity and license of the whole affair and the good-humored manner in which the work was set forth rendered it well nigh impossible for offence to be taken.

The Lord Mayor (Mr. Wallace Bruce) was represented by a humorously dressed figure as "Wolly Brooce." There has been some talk recently of the Lord Mayor receiving a knighthood when the Duke and Duchess of York visit Adelaide, and having this in mind, the students placarded his figure in the cart as "Receiving his nitehood." "The Lady Mare," as the inscription ran, was set off by a stylishly dressed student, whose charms Mrs. Bruce must have admired. Even the Duchess of York's baby was brought into the limelight, one student in feminine attire carrying a doll which proclaimed "The Dooke's Sweetie." The Governor also formed one of the party, and he was humorously labelled "Sir Tom Brooches." This cartload of celebrities with its burden of humor came in for a lot of attention from the crowds, and no little merriment was provoked.

"The Lie-Bury Commission."

Of course everybody knows that a Bribery Commission has been long in session, that it is still sitting, and that it is likely to go on for many months. One of the carts in the procession was devoted to this judicial body, which was proclaimed as having its 5761st sitting. It was facetiously described as the "Lie-Bury Commission." Another cart bore the inscription, "The moral Bribery Commission. Don't kill the goose that lays the golden egg." Several legal characters were depicted, with their fees. There was a policeman bearing the simple inscription "Bribed," and "K. K. Agoney, M.C.," was attired in counsel's wig and gown. "Slugarty" was a grotesque character, who was supposed to be "Nite-keeper to Slammed Hard & Co." Another amusing figure reminiscent of the Bribery Commission was "Slammed-Hard's" for quality. Special discount for Copper.

His Favorite Jelly.

No procession of this character would the students thought, be complete without reference to a well-known member of Parliament who has the knack of keeping himself in the public eye. Accordingly, on a very modest icecream cart was "Bert Edwards's favorite dish, Jelly," the appropriateness of which will be grasped by the average political student. Then there was "Herr Torn Broochers, I scream." A tilt at "Webb's engines" was naturally to be expected. There was a diminutive model, "The Webster, the biggest god darned injun in the world," with "S.A.R." emblazoned in front. It was given the humiliating position in the procession of being drawn by a cart, although considerable fuel was thereby saved, a factor which would appeal strongly to Mr. Webb.

"Cash Up, No Tick."

The Traffic Court and "Speed Cops" were set off by a cart and a motor cycle with a sidecar. "Wild Haul" was the magistrate, and his motto was "Cash up, no tick." Two businesslike "cops" were seated in the car. "The Vulgar Boatman" comprised a grotesque crew of eight in a four-oared boat; there was a Shiek and harem and two men inside huge rubber tyres. "The trouserless brigade" provided a new feature for the correspondence columns. The men had barrels round them, but had a counter-attraction in the trouserless brigade. A student on one of the old-time bicycles, purporting to be "A Lewis High Grade," experienced considerable difficulty in maintaining his equilibrium, and was a source of great amusement. One of the objects of the procession was to attract attention to last night's concert, and this assuredly was achieved. "Do you like sex plays?" asked one placard. "If so, come and see 'Back Ballast'."

A NIGHT OUT.

The University students held their Commemoration Concert at the Prince of Wales Theatre at night, and had a joyous time. Those in the gallery greeted the arrival of their friends in the more expensive seats with derisive howls, and asked them where they
