Did I mention that the Galton Laboratory Serum Unit, now under the Medical Research Council, supplying testing rluids from the School of Pathology at Cambridge, often have meed of animal material? I was discussing yesterday with Drs. Taylor and Race a biggish co-operative programme involving the secreting factor, when they mentioned that it would be exdeedingly valuable to them to be able to test the anti-gemic content of a number, E.G. a dozen, samples of cow serum with a view to getting a pint or so of any one of them which turned out to be potent. It is the so-called Anti-O anti-gedrowhich they are in need of. For testing they like about 10 to 20 cc. of whole blood, and I thought you could probably let them have a number ofsamples with a view to setting them up with a good Anti-O serum for future use. If this is all plain sailing, you might send Taylor ( Dr.G.L. Taylor) a line direct; if not, just let me know.
