SCIENCE AND PRODUCTION

South Australian producers must adopt more scientific methods. That, in a word, is the moral of two addresses delivered this week by Sir W. E. Richardson... the annual Winter School at Rosworthy..."

But as Dr. Richardson shows, the attainment of a maximum standard is not necessary to make wheat-growing a "permanently profitable industry"... a yield of from 18 to 20 bushels would do that..."

In order to get the best results from early-fallowed, carefully-mowed, properly sown, rationally-manured land the seed source.
