UNIVERSITY INTELLECTUAL INTERCOURSE

Although the imparting of knowledge is the main function of the university, its activities and utilities should not terminate there. Those and doctrines do not fulfil the great object of education unless they turn it to some useful account. Otherwise they become counterparts of the steward who buried his five talents. Every possible effort should therefore be made to make effective the learning which is acquired at the university.

Hitherto students have found themselves in a teaching institution where there were no facilities for social and intellectual communing, whereby they might exchange ideas and thresh out difficult problems in the light of their individual studies and according to the bent of their own

In Sydney and Melbourne there are residential colleges attached to the universities, where there is a great deal of the social and intellectual

Adelaide has no such colleges and it is advisable that some steps should be taken to bring about social relations between the students, not change of knowledge and provide for the spread of calightenment, so that the fruits of erudition may be reaped in abundance.

This most desirable object is now to be achieved. By a generous donation of £ 10,000 Sir Josiah Symon has made possible the establishment of a University Union for Women. Tonight a meeting will be held in the Adelaide Town Hall to inaugurate a campaign for funds for the establishment of a Men's Union, with a common refectory for both unions.

There should be no doubt about obtaining the required funds, especially when it is remembered that the building is also to embody a memorial for the 470 students who served in the war, and more especially for the 63 whose lives were sacrificed in the conflict,

From the foundation of the union there should grow a fellowship among the students. This is impossible in existing conditions and should prove as beneficial to the students themselves as to the whole community. From the social, intellectual, and cultural standpoints the union must mean a big forward movement in the university life of the State. Indeed, its advantages can scarcely be overestimated,

Many generous donations have been made to the Adelaide University in recent times. This appeal, too, should find a response among those who are anxious to see the efforts for the advancement of education and knowledge made thoroughly and abundantly effective.
