

RHODES SCHOLAR.

MR. F. W. WAGNER SELECTED.

A SUCCESSFUL CAREER.

Mr. F. W. Wagner was selected as the new Rhodes scholar for South Australia at a meeting of the trust held at Government House on Tuesday. Mr. Wagner has had a successful career as a student and athlete, and his selection will be popular among all classes. The unsuccessful candidates were among the first to congratulate him upon his success.

Mr. Wagner was born on October 26, 1905, at North-east-road, Walkerville, and his father is a watchmaker. He attended St. Andrew's day school during the years 1912-1913, the Grange public school 1913-1914, Queen's School 1915-1922, and the Adelaide University from 1923 up to the present time. He has passed the following public and University examinations:—Junior public—English, arithmetic, algebra, geometry, history, physics, and chemistry; senior public—English, Latin (credit), French, geometry, arithmetic and algebra (credit), trigono-

metry (credit), physics, chemistry (credit); higher public—Pure mathematics, applied mathematics, physics, and chemistry (credit). He was awarded a Government bursary at the last-mentioned examination. At the University he secured exemption from lectures and examinations in applied mathematics I. and chemistry I. His studies at the University included physics, pure mathematics and applied mathematics, and he is now sitting for the examination in honors in physics, which will complete his course.

In his application Mr. Wagner stated that during his latter years at school he decided to study physics because he thought he saw in it an explanation of the deep-seated nature of things. The wonder of modern physics and the glory of Einstein were new to the world. It was as romance that physics first made its appeal. Matter was for him a mystery to be solved. It had been his keenest wish for some time to be able to devote his time to the study of physics, beginning with a critical study of scientific knowledge and extending thence to more latent and universal forms, e.g., the conditions of the conscious and unconscious outgrowth of the social organism. There was one thing of which he felt certain. That was that the study of physics was most important, and that his interest in it was growing stronger and stronger.

During Mr Wagner's term at the University he has been hon. secretary and president of the Science Association, and hon. treasurer of the Sports Association. He has played in inter-University football and cricket matches on several occasions, being awarded his cricket blue in 1925-26. He played in the inter-State Colts' match, and was chosen to replace one of the selected men for the Western Australian tour who could not make the trip. For those fixtures he was unavailable. During the past two years he has assisted in demonstrating physics in the physics department of the University.

The new Rhodes scholar has been a decidedly useful member of the University cricket team since the 1923-24 season. He played in a few matches that year. In 1924-25 University were second in the district cricket competition, and Wagner took 18 wickets at a cost of 25.88. The next season University won the premier ship. Wagner's share being 26 wickets (average 24.12), and a batting average of 15.50. Last season he took 14 wickets (average 20.42) and made 142 runs (average 22.33). This year he has not bowled much, and has taken three wickets for 78. He is an imperturbable batsman, and he gave a characteristic display against Kensington last season. University were fighting for a draw and Wagner batted for nearly two hours for 40 runs. He and Peidmore were the last pair. They

but on 51 runs and secured a draw amid great excitement. He is a slow, left arm bowler, an uncommon type. Mr. Wagner proposes to attend Balliol College at the Oxford University, and study for the arts course in honors philosophy, paying particular attention to the aspects outlined in his application. Queen's School has a fine record in respect of the Rhodes Scholarship, no fewer than six of its students having gained the distinction. Their names are Messrs. W. R. Reynolds, W. Ray, A. H. Clarke, R. J. Ruda, L. A. W. Morey, and F. W. Wagner.

Mr. G. H. Cowling, M.A., reader in English language and literature at the University of Leeds, was appointed to the chair of English language and literature at the University of Melbourne at a meeting of the council of the University yesterday (says the Melbourne "Arcus" of November 22). The position was rendered vacant by the departure of Professor Wallace to Sydney University. The committee to which the appointment was referred had before it eight applications lodged with the Agent-General in London and eight applications lodged in Melbourne. The London committee, after interviewing the three most likely applicants, recommended Mr. Cowling. The Australian candidates were reduced to one, Mr. R. C. Bald, evening lecturer and tutor in English at the University of Adelaide. Mr. Bald, who was interviewed by the committee, is aged 29 years, and was a Melbourne University student, who did a brilliant course in the English school under Professors Wallace and Sir Archibald Strong. The committee was impressed with Mr. Bald's scholastic career, but considered that the proved ability of Mr. Cowling gave him the advantage.
