Dr. A. M. Morgan has been appointed a member of the Fauna and Flora Board in place of Professor Wood Jones, who resigned.

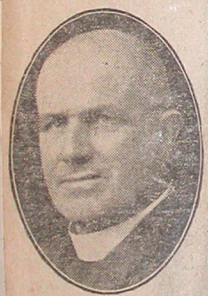

REV. W. F. WEHRSTEDT DEAD

Popular Port Adelaide Rector

ANGLICAN CHURCH LOSS

Rev. Walter Franz Wehrstedt, B.A., who has been rector of St. Paul's Church of England at Port Adelaide for the past six years, died at the rectory, Dale street, Port Adelaide, this morning after a brief illness. His death was unexpected as last week he appeared to be on the road to recovery but he suffered a relapse. A requiem service will be held in St. Paul's at 9.30 o'clock tomorrow morning and the funeral will leave at 10.30 for the North Road Cemetery, where the burial will take place at 11.30 o'clock. Revs. A. J. Kendall Baker, B.A., C. J. Whitfield, Th.L. (rector of St. James, West Adelaide), and B. C. Loan, B.A. (rector of St. Margaret's, Woodville), who were personal friends of Mr. Wehrstedt, will officiate.

Mr. Wehrstedt was an Anglo-Catholic and a man of brilliant intellect. He was

47 years of age and unmarried. Although he had been very and a witty theologian his church and its people. In times of illness and distress he always rendered invaluable service.

Deep Reader and Keen Critic
Mr. Wehrstedt took little interest in sport, but was fond of walking and swimming. He was a deep reader and a keen critic, and wrote many articles for the church paper.

Gaining the scholarship at St. John's Grammar School, Halifax street, Adelaide, Mr. Wehrstedt studied at St. Peter's College and subsequently at Adelaide University, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts in 1899. For a time he was assistant master at St. Peter's College, and then at the Wesleyan Grammar School. He served a curacy under the very Rev. Dean E. Young at Mount Gambier, and a close friendship resulted.

It was at St. James' Church, West Adelaide, that Mr. Wehrstedt did his 10 years.

He succeeded Rev. Mr. Williams, B.A., of Port Adelaide, in December, 1920, and was a preacher he had a distinct and original style. He introduced writtens that few Anglican clergymen would attempt.

For children he always had a warm place in his heart, and he was particularly good in his church grammar school, in which he taught at his spare time.

Tributes From Ministers
Owing to the illness of Mr. Wehrstedt, Very Rev. Anderson Adams, of the diocese of Willochra, permitted Rev. A. J. Kendall Baker, who is to be head of the new laity until further notice, to act at Port Adelaide, and the parishioners, Voluntary Aid Detachment, was also rendered by Rev. C. J. Whitfield. Mr. Wehrstedt was successor to Mr. Rev. E. C. Loan paid a tribute to the death of the rector, "As yet we have not realised the enormity of the loss to St. Paul's, Port Adelaide, and to the diocese of Adelaide by a so lovable a man," he said. "He was a man who will be missed. We have been and I shall miss him sadly.
