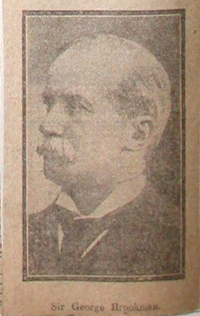

A PUBLIC-SPIRITED CITIZEN.

DEATH OF SIR GEORGE BROOKMAN.

By the death of Sir George Brookman, who died last night at his residence, Avenel Gardens, Melrose, South Australia, has lost an honored citizen, and one whose many activities played an important part in the educational and commercial progress of the State. In politics, education, commerce, and work of a philanthropic nature, he took a deep and intelligent interest, and his name will always be identified with many of the institutions which have made for national advancement. Born in Glasgow on August 18, 1839, he was the son of Mr. Benjamin Brookman of Prospect. He arrived at Port Adelaide on the ship Water Lily with his parents on May 5, 1852. After his education had been completed, he began his commercial career with Messrs D. & J. Fowler. Later he began business on his own account as a stock and share broker. It was in Stock Exchange a member of the Adelaide Stock Exchange. He showed considerable enterprise and an aptitude for commerce and finance, but it was in connection with the development of gold mining in Western Australia that he found his great opportunity. One of the organizers of the syndicate which discovered the now famous Golden Mile at Kalbarrie in 1883, fortune smiled on him and he quickly rose to a position of affluence, which enabled him to offer financial
